First 'Night Market' draws manageable, excited crowd

The first Chelsea Night Market is being deemed a success, bringing a good crowd to Luther Place for the music, vendors and excitement in the

"It was great," said Downtown Coordinator Mimi Graney. "We had a decent, manageable crowd. The attendees and vendors were all really pleased. We had lots of neighbors attend, which was great. There were no major technical snags and the fire performance was a hit."

The Night Market blocked off the City parking lot behind

the main business district, using the refurbished Chelsea Walk as an entry point. On the lot were vendors with all kinds of wares, food servers and a stage. Musical acts were popular, but the hit of the night was the Boston Circus Guild's fire-breathing and juggling performance.

The next Night Market will be on July 13, and coordinators said to look for some new and different things to be on the docket.

The next event for the downtown, however, is the Fiesta Verano – a great Latin music themed event that was cancelled last year three times due to rain. This year they

hope to find some better luck. They will have the Fiesta on Second Street and in collaboration with the Chelsea

Cooperative. Look for a cowboy them, Graney said.

"We're embracing a rodeo theme this year with pony rides and a bounce house for little ones," said Graney. "A 'bike rodeo,' presented by the Chelsea Bike and Ped Committee and MassBike, is an obstacle course and games for all ages so bring your bike or trike. Over on the big lawn a mechanical bull will be bucking and kicking all riders for your merriment.'

Encore opening procedures, training running smoothly ahead of opening

Three weeks makes a difference.

That's the message from Encore Boston Harbor President Bob DeSalvio when it comes to the preparations for the opening of the resort casino on June 23. DeSalvio said that hiring a majority of the workers to train for three weeks, as compared to the one-week average in the industry, will be worth every penny.

"In general we are in a very good position right now," he said on Tuesday. "I feel like the construction, the hiring and the trainings are all coming together extremely well. Right now the number one item is about working on training and role playing on our own people in preparation for the arrival of our first guests. It was good to get the team in early and have the mass orientation on June 3. The access to the building was critical to making sure we had the necessary time to prepare."

DeSalvio said many in the industry will bring on most ahead of opening. Some might stretch that to two weeks. However, a three week, 20day solid training period is unique.

"We have a full 20 days to completely fine-tine and have five-star service levels and standards," he said. "That's a big part of what we do. It's an expanded preparation time, but that's important to us... Literally having three weeks is pretty unique, but it's worth every penny because we'll get to thoroughly train our team members to that we can expect to deliver a flawless opening."

Right now, workers are busy role playing, helping one another, and collaborating with helpers from the Las Vegas resorts - who are initiating the new workers from the Boston area into the company service standards.

"The next couple days we start very intensive role playing preparations with our team – we'll eat at the restaurants and walk all of the corridors," he said. "We plan to occupy every single guest room before guests arrive...We

employees about a week want to make sure we've got everything covered. By occupying the rooms, it gives us a chance to see everything to make sure it's working - the air conditioners, the lighting and the TV. It's a great way to get it done instead of waiting for guests to come in and have to bring something like that to our attention."

> That also goes for the kitchens - cooking meals for practice to make sure everything is working correctly and all of the materials are in place for when the first guests arrive.

DeSalvio said a good deal of what is happening now on the construction front is interior work and bringing in food and retail supplies.

The construction phase, he said, is done for the most part - meaning that the largest single-phase construction project in the state's history came in on time.

"Construction is winding down," he said. "They're doing minor landscaping and doing some interior finish work. But for the most part, the con-

The surf is up for Chelsea's Deedee Hernandez, who might be the first and only Chelsea High valedictorian that doubles as a surfer, a trumpet player and Ivy League student.

Hernandez has been very active in the school and community over the last four years, but being at the top of her class wasn't something she thought would happen.

"Honestly, I wasn't aspiring for the valedictorian of the class," she said. "My only goal was just to get into a college. That was a goal since I entered middle school. My mother always told us that we had to go to college. That was always a goal we were reaching for."

And not only did she reach it, but she grabbed onto a great school in the Ivy League Dart-

MIKE MORIN DELIVERS A STRIKE

Author's inside look at TV candlepin bowling is a must-read for fans

Chelsea was once home to two candlepin bowling establishments, Broadway Lanes owned by George Michelson, and Chelsea Square Alleys, owned by Chet Pawlak.

In addition to each man being beloved in the Chelsea bowling community, Mr. Michelson and Mr. Pawlak shared another distinction: George and Charlotte Michelson and Chet and Carole Pawlak each had two children who bowled on television. Bonnie and Robert Michelson and Kathy [Finklestein] and Christine Pawlak earned their places among the ranks of the world's best bowlers by appearing on Channel 5 bowling shows.

Mike Morin, a New Hampshire radio celebrity and a long-time candlepin bowler himself, has written a book

pin bowlers everywhere.

And yes, Hall of Fame bowler Richie "Hawk" Halas and the great Max Valentin, who launched their pro careers at Broadway Lanes (atop Slaton's Furniture Store) would also take pride in reading Morin's work.

Morin has authored, "Lunch With Tommy and Stasia: TV's Golden Age of Candlepin Bowling," a look at all the candlepin bowling TV shows that once graced the airwaves.

And in another Chelsea connection to the book, Charlie Sherman, a former Shawmut Street resident and highly acclaimed New Hampshire TV personality, wrote the foreword for Morin's book.

The book was two years in the making. Writing about candlepin bowling was a natural fit for the 68-year-old Mo-

"I felt I had some inside knowledge because I did some work for the ICBA, appeared on the TV show (Candlepin Stars and Strikes on Channel 50) for nine years, and on radio (his broadcasting career spanned 48 years) – I felt I had the right combination of interest and skill to do the book," said Morin.

The author grew up in Detroit and was a ten-pin bowler for 30 years. When Morin moved to New England in 1984, he began bowling candlepins and still competes regularly at Park Place Lanes in Windham, N.H.

"The book was something I had been thinking about for ten years, but I finally had the opportunity to write it when I retired from my radio career," he said. "I was honored to do

Morin said the first bowling show was televised on Channel 5 in 1958 and continued until January, 1996. "The initial host was Jim Britt and about three years in, Don Gillis took it over and rode it all the way to the end," noted Morin.

A former champion on the Amateur Candlepin Tour (ACT), Morin places his focus on the Channel 5 (WCVB-TV) show in the book.

"That's where the biggest stars and the biggest names came from, and it was on for the longest number of years and had the most viewers, over 200,000 people every week," said Morin. "Very often the Channel 5 show had ratings higher than any other sports show on any given weekend."

Bowling fans will be delighted by Morin's interviews with more than 75 bowling stars including Dan Murphy, Charlie Jutras, Jim Putney, Hawk Halas, Chucky Vozella and of course, Tommy Olszta, whom Morin considers the best of all time.

"Tommy did it when he had to – he had more appearances on the Channel 5 show

than anyone else," said Morin. "He was a gentleman, a fierce competitor."

Other "phenomenal bowlers," according to Morin include Chris Sargent and his father, Mike Sargent, Charlie Jutras, and Jeff Atkins.

Three of bowling's currents superstars, Jonathan Boudreau, Jeff Surette, and Dave Barber, are also featured in the

"Jonathan is phenomenal," said Morin. "I feel badly because he was born too late to take advantage of all the television opportunities that the other guys had."

The book is generating positive responses in the bowling community and beyond. Bowling center owners and the bowlers themselves are thankful and grateful to Morin because there has not been a book written about candlepin bowling since 1980.

"This book covers all the people who were on TV," said Morin. "And I got a lot of the behind-the-scenes stories that people never heard before."

Morin also did some research and met with the children of Arthur Terlemezian, the gentleman who sat in the front row during Channel 5 shows and wore his traditional glasses and cardigan sweaters.

Morin has done several book signings at bookstores, libraries, and bowling centers. "I get the best results, no surprise, when I go to bowling centers," he related.

As for the book's unique title, Morin explained, "Because candlepin bowling was such a tradition on Saturdays at noon, people would sit down with their lunch trays or tray tables in front of the TV, and they would have lunch with their favorite bowling stars, who I felt were Tommy and Stasia. So that's why I called it "Lunch With Tommy and Stasia, because that's what people did every Saturday for 38 years."

Legislature approves Chapter 90 funds

The Massachusetts Legislature passed a bill authorizing \$200 million for Chapter 90 funding to help municipalities complete road, bridge and infrastructure improvement projects. The bill also facilitates the financing of \$1.5 billion for highway projects and \$200 million for rail projects at the Massachusetts Department of Transportation.

De-Leo (D-Winthrop). "These investments support our vibrant economy by improving our transportation infrastructure."

RoseLee Vincent (D-Revere). We have been remiss for not having offered our congratulations to Chelsea native Brian Sullivan upon his recent appointment by Gov. Charlie Baker, and subsequent confirmation by the Governor's Council, to the position of Clerk-Magistrate of the Lynn District Court.

Brian's ascension to the clerk-magistrate's position culminates a long career in the court system that began as a Probation Officer in the Chelsea District Court in 1986. He became an assistant clerk-magistrate in that court and then the Salem District Court before being named the Acting Clerk Magistrate of the Cambridge District Court prior to his appointment to the Lynn District Court.

Brian is a Chelsea guy through-and-through. His dad, the late Vincent Sullivan, who was the long-time Assistant Commandant of the Chelsea Soldiers Home, and his mom, Eleanor, raised their four children in the Mill Hill section of the city, where they were one of the most-respected families in Chelsea.

Brian attended St. Rose grammar school before going on to Malden Catholic and Northeastern University. He was a member of the Chelsea Knights of Columbus and was wellknown as a member of the K of C's softball team in the heyday of the Chelsea Modified Fast Pitch Softball League when that league drew huge crowds to Highland Park in the early 1980s.

Brian married the former Paula Hansbury, who also is a Chelsea native and well-known Chelsea High grad, and they have raised their family in Swampscott.

If we were writing this column in another era, it might have been titled, "Local boy makes good." We know we speak for all of those who have been friends and acquaintances of Brian Sullivan and his family through the years in offering our congratulations to Brian upon his appointment and in wishing him continued success in his outstanding career in the Massachusetts judicial system.

SPEAKER DELEO PREPARES FOR THE FUTURE

Massachusetts House Speaker Robert DeLeo this week unveiled the details of the plan he announced last February that will provide \$1.3 billion to combat the ever-increasing effects of climate change. Among the major aspects of the plan will be the awarding of grants to cities and towns across the state to encourage green energy initiatives and climate change resiliency efforts, which are particularly needed for our vulnerable coastal communities.

The grant program, called GreenWorks, would be funded by \$1 billion in bonds and paid out over a decade. The program, to be run by the state Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs, will allow local governments to seek grants for a variety of projects that will focus on climate change preparedness and clean energy production in order to reduce carbon emissions.

The bill also would set aside an additional \$295 million in state spending for energy infrastructure, including \$100 million for municipal microgrid systems to increase the resiliency of the electricity grid and \$125 million for electric vehicles in municipal fleets and regional transit authorities.

Speaker DeLeo's GreenWorks initiative represents a major step forward in protecting our vulnerable coastline, while at the same time creating jobs in the green energy and clean

Given the urgency and pressing need to address the issue of climate change, which is occurring at an ever-accelerating pace, we urge our state senators to join with Speaker DeLeo and the Mass. House in presenting a bill for Gov. Charlie Baker's signature by the end of this year.



Celebrate our rivers in June

At long last, a recent weekend presented one of those pristine days that remind us here in Massachusetts why we endure those winters. With warm spring weather finally here, many of us hit the water for the first time this year, visiting local rivers. With more than 10,000 miles of rivers traversing the state, we had many choices. Sail boats blossomed on the Charles. Rowers huffed and puffed on the Mystic. Fishing rods sprouted along the Swift. Bikers and kayakers explored the Sudbury. For many people, the beautiful day meant a chance to spend on, in and around the rivers of Massachusetts.

Fittingly, June is National Rivers Month, a 30-day gala celebrating our waterways. Whether you kayak past important Revolutionary War sites on the Concord River, hike over the Bridge of Flowers on the Deerfield, draw water for local crops from

the Connecticut, or depend into the wastewater system on drinking water from the Merrimack, National Rivers Month is a time to celebrate the gains we have made in protecting these important public recreational, economic and historic assets.

National Rivers Month, however, is also a time to reflect on what remains to be accomplished. The Massachusetts Rivers Alliance, the voice for Massachusetts rivers, is a statewide environmental advocacy non-profit that helps those whose lives are touched by these Massachusetts waterways (and we would argue, that's all of us). Consider, for example, pending legislation regarding sewage overflows around the state. Very old stormwater and wastewater systems serving municipalities in the state have what are called "combined sewage overflow" (CSO) systems. Through these CSOs, stormwater and wastewater systems are physically interconnected. At times of high precipitation, stormwater run-off goes

these backups, wastewater the sewage from your homes and businesses – is dumped directly into Massachusetts rivers. Approximately 200 of these CSO connections exist throughout the state. In Massachusetts, an estimated three billion gallons of raw sewage gets dumped into the state's rivers each year. Swimmers, canoeists, and pets exposed to CSO contaminants are vulnerable to gastroenteritis, respiratory infections, eye or ear infections, skin rashes, hepatitis and other diseases. Children, the elderly, and people with suppressed immune systems are especially vulnerable. Wildlife are also adversely affected by CSO pollutants which lead to higher water temperatures, increased turbidity, toxins and reduced oxygen levels in the water.

Everyone recognizes the problem. But it takes money to fix it, more money than is now available. Over the past two decades, Massachusetts communities have spent more than \$1 billion to eliminate CSOs. The federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimates, however, that an additional \$4.2 billion is needed to finish the job.

In addition to supporting efforts to increase state and federal funding to eliminate CSOs, Mass Rivers is championing a simple sewage notification bill now pending before the Massachusetts legislature. Disturbingly, there is currently no state requirement to notify the public about the presence of sewage in the

water when these discharges occur.

The legislation supported by Mass Rivers would require the operator of a CSO to notify local boards of health, in addition to the state Department of Public Health, within two hours after a sewage spill begins. In addition, the public could sign up to receive these notifications, by text, e-mail, phone call or tweet. The state Department of Environmental Protection would be required to centralize all sewage spill data and make it available on the internet. Signage would be required at all public access points (for boating, fishing, beaches) near CSO outfalls as well.

National Rivers Month is a time to shake off those indoor blues and enjoy Massachu-

setts' bounty of rivers. Whether you go to look for great blue herons, to fish for trout, to take your family and the dog on an afternoon paddling adventure, or simply to seek calm and quiet, our state's rivers are there for you. To preserve these friends, and to ensure the safety of those who use our rivers, National Rivers Month should also be a time for towns and cities to insist that our legislators enact a requirement that when the waters are despoiled with sewage spills, we know about it.







Daniel Mikolajewski of Chelsea died on May







NEW GAS STATION OPENS AT LOGAN; WILL SOON HOUSE MERIDIAN MARKET, STARBUCKS

EAST BOSTON - Soon Jeffries Point residents will no longer have to walk or drive to Central Square or McClellan Highway to get their Meridian Market or Starbucks fixes.

Massport announced that a new convenience and filling station opened on the Logan Airport campus on Tomahawk Drive on Saturday, June 1. Massport also announced that Eastie's famed Meridian Market has been selected as the deli business within the new gas station and Starbucks will be the station's coffee vendor.

The new gas station, which is being relocated due to the Terminal E modernization project, could be a boon for the gas station operator, Meridian Market and Starbucks. Total gross sales of the former gas station last year were \$10,840,340. This amount included fuel pump sales at the gas station, Dunkin' Donuts, and retail sales from the filling station deli and convenience store.

The new station features a Shell gas station with open space and a park-like layout, which will be completed this summer.

Massport's Acting CEO John Pranckevicius said Meridian Market and Starbucks should open this summer. He said having a community partner like a Meridian Market to run its sandwich shop and deli is part of Massport's plan to increase more local business opportunities at the airport.

"It was important to the community to develop an attractive, functional convenience store and gas station facility that includes local food options and open community space, said Pranckevicius. "We wish to thank the new station owners for designing a great facility that the Airport and community will both enjoy".

As part of this project and due to its close proximity to the Jeffries Point neighborhood, Massport is improving the physical space around the new filling station. The space will feature a number of amenities including public open green space with a patio, electric vehicle charging stations, and walk able access to the

community. The design of the space was inspired by the out-door veranda at the Bremen Street Library that overlooks Massport's Bremen Street Park

"The convenience and filling station will be an attractive and functional store and gas station with modern features that will not only serve Logan Airport but the Jeffries Point neighborhood as well," added Pranckevicius.

EXCEL OFFICIALS LAY OUT PLANS TO EXPAND HIGH SCHOOL

EAST BOSTON - At a recent community meeting, Excel Academy Charter School Executive Director Owen Stearns and Excel's Pat Forbest and Dan Mills laid out the plans to expand the High School on Bremen Street to include a middle school.

The plan includes building the new middle school facility over the current parking lot at Excel Academy High School. Most of the parking spaces in the lot, which is between the school and the Bremen Street Branch Library, will remain and the schools plans to lease additional off site spaces to accommodate for teacher and staff parking.

The expansion is part of Excel's 2014 plan to accommodate the growing student population.

population.

Excel opened first a middle school in Eastie in 2003, a second middle school in Chelsea in 2011, a third middle school in Orient Heights in 2012 and the neighborhood's first charter high school on Bremen Street in 2016.

"This month we will see the first 100 graduating class of seniors from our high school," said Stearns. "Excel has educated approximately 2,000 students in Grades 5-12 since 2003."

Stearns said the expansion of the high school facility to include a middle school is Phase 3 of the school's plan outlined in 2014.

This plan will increase the student population from 896 to 924 and increase the school's footprint on Bremen Street from 71,000 square feet to 79,500 square feet.

According to Forbest and Mills, traffic studies have been conducted regarding bus

and car traffic.

At the meeting the Excel team also laid out its transportation and traffic management plan. The school plans to increase the number of staff managing flow of bus/ auto queue. Increase number of staff to manage student pedestrian activity on both sides of Bremen Street. Cars will be assigned to specific pickup and drop-off areas. Excel agrees to pay a fine for any parent blocking driveways and will ask BTD to supply meter maids as necessary. The school will Increase communication with parents on policies, install school zone signage and change to staggered arrival times if traffic becomes too much of an issue in the mornings.

Forbest said the school would also improve residential access to Excel parking lot when school is not in session. Lot signage will be revised to indicate available parking for library patrons and neighbors from 4 p.m. to 6 a.m. every day. However, any non-Excel car that remains past 6 a.m. may be towed.

On weekends and statewide holidays when public schools are closed, neighbors will be able to park in the lot during normal school hours.

"For evening or weekend events which necessitate utilizing the parking lot, the lot will be closed and Excel will post on Twitter and Facebook announcing the hours the lot will be closed for special events and state that any cars parked will be towed," said Forbest. "In addition, sandwich boards will be posted at the entrance and exit of the parking lot listing the days/ times the lot will be closed and when cars will be towed."

During inclement weather no parking will be allowed in the lot when cars could impede snow removal.

Back in 2017 Excel expanded the footprint of the high school to give the senior class more classroom and flex space as they take electives and advanced placement classes

The school added 2,500 sq. ft. in the rear of the building near the East Boston Greenway, which resulted in roughly a 10-percent increase in the building's overall size.

The addition had no impact on the Greenway or Greenway access. There was some

Black (

concerns of runoff from the building due to flooding problems along the Greenway closer to Jeffries Point and the school's close proximity to the neighborhood park system. However, the school, which is LEED certified, uses a system of storm water storage that traps that slowly release storm water from the building after heavy rain.

Formerly the site of Paul's Park and Fly, the last of the park and fly companies that once dotted Bremen Street, the \$25 million Excel High School was built on stretch of land that now includes a state of the art library and the sprawling 18-acre Bremen Street Park,

The new two-acre campus includes the main building, community rooms, a cafeteria, gymnasium, office space, and support space. The school also includes a 30-car pick up and drop off area, a dedicated bus pull off area, a 50-space parking lot for faculty and visitors, and a 24,100 square-foot outdoor student courtyard.

SHORT TERM RENTALS SUBJECT TO FEE

EVERETT - At the City Council meeting on Tuesday, May 28, Councilors unanimously approved a measure that would charge a 3 percent Community Impact Fee to the operators of short-term rentals in the City of Everett, including those using Airbnb and other rental booking sites.

It will go into effect July 1. The fee is part of the Short-Term Rental Ordinance approved by the Council earlier this year. Councilors were given the option to impose between 1 percent and 3 percent in the Community Impact Fee, and they chose the maximum.

Operators of short-term rentals will be assessed the 3 percent fee paid directly to the Department of Revenue (DOR) in the form of an excise on the total rental revenue. The State will then give that back to the City on a quarterly basis and Councilors voted that the fee go toward affordable housing and infrastructure. This fee is on top of the 6 percent Occupancy Excise that short-term rental operators are already paying to the DOR as of March 4.

A short-term rental is de-

fined as any stay under 31 consecutive days and would not apply to month-to-month leases or leases over one month. However, the Community Impact Fee is only applicable to rentals that are managed through a registered booking agent.

In addition to the 3 percent fee, the new ordinance requires that all short-term rental properties managed through a booking site be fully licensed just like any other business. Rental operators must apply for a license with the City, pay for said license, and have the license approved by the City Clerk in order to operate legally.

This went into effect on March 4 when it was signed by the Mayor.

"If they are in operation without a license, they will receive a cease and desist order," said City Clerk Sergio Cornelio. "Please be sure you have all the licenses needed."

He added that rental owners who continue to operate without a license will be subject to fines.

The new ordinance comes amid a surge of local rentals being listed on booking sites like Airbnb and Vrbo ahead of the opening of Encore Boston Harbor this summer.

"We have to do this. We have a ton of Airbnbs," said Councilwoman Rosa DiFlorio. "With the growth coming with the casino, [they] are going to be more popular."

Platforms like Airbnb and Vrbo allow homeowners to rent out rooms in their home or units in their building to guests for short-term stays. Residents are hoping to take advantage of the coming tidal wave of out-of-town visitors who want to use the casino but don't want to pay a premium to stay at the Encore hotel, where, according to its Chief Communications Officer Michael Weaver, rooms will start at \$645 per night.

rentals available in Everett yields a smattering of options on the streets surrounding Broadway and beyond. They range in price from \$29 per night for an entire three-bedroom apartment on Marie Avenue, to \$350 per night for a six-bedroom, ten-bed house on Summit Avenue. Some posters tout their proximity to the casino in their listings as a way to entice possible guests.

A quick Airbnb search of

In order to make the public aware of the new rental requirements, the City plans to release announcements on Everett Community Television as well as take out ads in the local papers.

Clerk Cornelio admitted that it would take a lot of legwork to acquaint the community to the new laws.

"It's a slow process," he allowed. "No one's had the licensing before. We're trying to move forward as proactively as we can."

The Clerk also added that he and his team are using sites like Airbnb to identify unlicensed short-term rentals in the city and to reach out to their operators.

CASINO'S TRANSPORTATION PLANS DISCUSSED

EVERETT - On Tuesday, May 28, the Council held a special meeting to hear a presentation by John Tocco, executive director Of Government Affairs and Community Relations at Encore Boston Harbor, who laid out the resort casino's transportation plan for opening weekend and beyond.

"It's a pleasure for me personally to be a part of such a wonderful opportunity for thousands of people," said Tocco. "To see it happening there today, to see 1,600 people from the surrounding towns working there already has been an amazing experience. This is what we set out to do seven years ago."

His presentation touched on three key areas: transportation, the grand opening, and public relations/marketing.


•Transportation

Tocco detailed the number of transportation options that Encore is offering to bring people to and from its site. These include parking options for cars as well as bikes, ride services such as limousines and taxis/rideshares, a water shuttle and various bus options.

Encore has a fleet of four water taxis, which will connect the casino to Boston's Seaport and Financial District for \$7 per ride. Councilors had originally expressed concern about traffic backups caused by the frequent lifting of the

Alford Street Bridge. While it tation updates to the public has not yet released its water taxi schedule, Encore's Chief Communications Officer Michael Weaver said in an interview with Independent that its water taxis are small enough to pass under the bridge without having to lift it.

In addition to the MBTA bus routes, Encore is presenting a number of its own buses. The free Encore Shuttle will connect the casino to Malden and Wellington Stations. The free Encore Neighborhood Runner will snake through Rivergreen, City Hall and Chelsea's Mystic Mall. The Encore Premium Motor Coach will offer a \$7 ride to free parking options in MA and NH. There will also be a shuttle exclusively for Encore employees.

"Our objective is to keep as many people out of their vehicles as possible," said Tocco. "The MBTA is critical for our success."

The presentation identified a number of different lots where out-of-town visitors can park their vehicles to make use of the different transportation options to the casino: Wellington Station, Station Landing, Rivergreen, Malden Station, Jackson Garage, Malden Center, Wonderland Station and Lower Broadway.

•Grand Opening

Tocco dispelled any rumors of a delayed opening, stating that the resort was on schedule to open on its original projected date of June 23.

"Our operations team is working around the clock making sure everything is put together," he said. "It's a testament to our team to get this monumental task up and running."

As part of its grand opening plan, Tocco also noted the bike and pedestrian connection that goes under the MBTA tracks and over to the Gateway Mall site by Costco, adding that the idea is to "keep as many people off of Broadway and out of neighborhoods."

Opening weekend will see an increased police detail comprised of officers from the Everett, Boston and Medford Police Departments; State the US Coast Guard; the Police Marine Units of the Everett, Boston and State Police; and the Boston Department of Public Works. Moving beyond opening weekend, law enforcement presence will be reassessed as needed.

•Public Relations and Marketing

Encore hired a public relations agency to enhance public awareness about its transportation options, its dedication to minimizing traffic and its commitment to improving in-

Encore's marketing and communications team also

and to field questions from visitors. Its website will allow visitors to view transportation schedules and to book trips on its Premium Motor Coach. Local and regional wayfinding signage will direct drivers to Encore with highway signs along routes 16, 90 and 93, and street signs in Everett and East Somerville.

Overall, Councilors expressed cautious optimism regarding Encore's transportation plan.

"I think it's going to be a great project. I can't wait to see it," said Councilor John McKinnon. "But as a member of this board, we need to make sure it's going to go right for the host community. We don't want to be waiting years to get [things] fixed."

"No matter how much planning you've done, we're still going to have issues the first couple of months," said Councilwoman Rosa DiFlorio. "Everett needs to expect this. After two or three months. we correct the issues, but we don't have a crystal ball."

"We know people aren't going to jump on these buses the first day. The intent is to educate people to do that," said Councilor Peter Napolitano. "The opening day command team will meet to assess what works and what doesn't work."

Councilor Wayne Matewsky proposed his idea of a dedicated suggestion hotline managed by Encore where residents can share about what is and isn't working in their communities. The idea is to reduce the number of calls being sent directly to Councilors. Encore currently has a community inquiry line, but it is not exclusively for complaints.

"I would like to have it installed before you open and advertised to the citizenry of this community," he said. "We're on the same page, we want a great city. But I don't want people calling me on a daily basis if they have an issue regarding Encore."

Encore put together its transportation plan in consultation with various public and government entities: the Police, MBTA Transit Police; police departments of Everett, Boston, Chelsea, Malden, Medford and Somerville; State Police; US Coast Guard; the Police Marine Units of Everett, Boston and Massachusetts; the Transportation Departments of Everett and Boston; MassDOT Highway Division; MBTA Operations and Planning: Boston Public Works; Massport and the Massachusetts Gaming Commission.

POINT OF PINES MAY GET NEW FIRE **STATION**

REVERE - The process that will result in a brand-new Point of Pines Fire Station on the site of the old station located at 140 Lynnway is well underway.

During his remarks to the City Council about "the long-awaited feasibility study" for the station, Mayor Brian Arrigo said that Winter Street Architects (the firm that did the feasibility study) has recommended that the old fire station be demolished and a new fire station be constructed - rather than a rehabilitation project for the current

but for the eastern part of our city in providing great service and public safety to our community," said Arrigo. "I want to thank Chief [Chris] Bright and Deputy Chief [Paul] Cheever for the great work they've done in pushing this forward and making this a reality."

Bright endorsed the construction of a new station.

"I'm very pleased to be before you with the results of the study," said Bright. "I've been very anxious to see this. As fire chief the past three years, I've really seen first-hand the need for this facility. We've had some storm surges down along Revere Beach, the Atlantic Ocean just coming in – Mills Avenue, Pearl Avenue, Beachmont. These storms are happening all the time now."

Bright added, "we feel the need is there [for a new fire station] and the time is right now, the city is in a much better financial position."

Ward 5 Councillor John Powers has long advocated for the restoration of services at the old station or the construction of a new one. Powers expressed his support for the project.

"With all the new woodframe construction going on in the city right now, this station is so sorely needed," said Powers. "I want to thank the mayor, Chief Bright, and the deputies for putting the effort into it that they did.'

City Council President Arthur Guinasso said the matter will be sent to Council sub-committees for further discussion and an extensive look at the plans for the new

Arrigo said after the meeting that the city will move forward with a presentation of a bond authorization for the project. He said the estimated cost of building a new 12,000 square-foot Point of Pines Fire Station is \$9 million, which would be paid over a 30-year period.

The bond-authorization would require a two-thirds vote of the City Council.

RIZZO SEEKS POLICE DETAIL ON NORTH SHORE RD.

REVERE - The City Council approved a motion by Councillor-at-Large Dan Riz-

instruct the chief of police to assign officers at the intersection of North Shore Road and Revere Street during peak hours of traffic.

Rizzo said he has personally experienced the traffic backups on Revere Street and Route 1A.

'Over the weekend coming down 1A, the traffic was backed up to the Wharf Restaurant," he said. "We should be utilizing traffic enforcement pulling traffic at peak hours. Get some police officers out there whether it's in conjunction with the State Police or the Revere Police Department.

"We need to have more than just the lighting doing a regular cycle," said Rizzo. "We need to utilize manpower to pull that traffic because people are getting extremely frustrated waiting.

Rizzo said there are problems with heavy, vehicular traffic across the city.

"The city right now is in gridlock," said the councillor. 'This city is in gridlock almost all day long with the exception of a few hours in the middle of the day.'

Ward 5 Councillor John Powers said he has be in touch with MassDOT officials about the traffic situation.

"The explanation that I received is that they are going to put in some wooden poles that they can put the lights on - they would expect to have the lights on early next week," said Powers.

Eric Lampedecchio of Taft Avenue thanked Councillor Rizzo for presenting his mo-

"It's an absolutely safety hazard on North Shore Road," said Lampedecchio. "A lot of people are disregarding the cones and taking that left in to the oncoming two lanes of traffic. It's only a matter of time until somebody gets hurt. MassDOT has been extremely slow to respond to this. It's been over five weeks since residents could take a left on to Mills Avenue.'

"I'm tired of hearing that traffic is a regional issue and there's nothing we can do about it," said Lampedecchio. "I think manually adjusting the traffic lights during peak hours is a great idea. COUNCIL APPROVES BUDGET

WINTHROP - After several attempts to amend the Town Manager's budget request the Town Council finally approved the FY20 budget figure (including enterprise funds, revolving funds and a one-time transfer for capital) is \$64,866,135.

The general fund budget of \$52,546,470 is a roughly 3 percent increase over FY19 budget of \$50,835,254.

The school department will receive \$21,275,036 a roughly 4 percent increase over the FY19 school budget of \$20,141,310.

Before the vote Tuesday night the council heard from Bob Wynne Jr., chairman of the Citizen's Advisory Committee on Finance.


"This is the first time for the Finance Committee to work with the new town management. The budget was completed much earlier than in the past," he said. "We also met with many more department heas than in the past.'

He added that the budget was based on the House of Representatives state budget which would give the town an additional \$178,476 in state aid. Of that amount the school department received \$113,726.

Of all the expenses the town faces one of the largest is the payment for regional dispatch. In the beginning four communities were supposed to be in it but only Revere and Winthrop are in the service and pay a hefty price. In fiscal year 2017 when the regional dispatch began the cost to Winthrop was \$192,600. Now in fiscal year 2020 the town has a fee of \$450,000.

"Regional dispatch is a good idea and both chiefs favor it. Grants have helped offset some of the cost but we are concerned about annual growth," Wynne said.

He also noted that this year is the first the ferry is not requesting any money from the town, it has found other funding sources, but he has concerns about its future should be running a ferry business.




JOCELYN POSTE CLASS PRESIDENT

MS-13 member sentenced for unlawful possession of a firearm

Staff Report

An MS-13 member was sentenced last week for being an illegal alien in possession of a firearm and ammunition.

Nery Rodriguez Diaz, 19, a Salvadoran national who resided in Chelsea, was sentenced by U.S. District Court Judge F. Dennis Saylor IV to 14 months in prison and three years of supervised release. Diaz will also be subject to deportation proceedings upon entered the United States in completion of his sentence.

On May 22, 2018, Diaz and another MS-13 member, Elmer Alfaro Hercules, were arrested in possession of loaded firearms in Bremen Street Park in East Boston, a location where numerous MS-13 gang members have been observed and where gang-on-gang violence frequently occurs.

The investigation revealed that Diaz and Hercules each separately and unlawfully

2014 as unaccompanied minors. Both Diaz and Hercules were charged federally for being aliens in possession of a firearm and ammunition.

Hercules previously pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 13 months in prison and three years of supervised release. Hercules will also be subject to deportation proceedings after the completion of his sentence.

Chelsea gang leader sentenced to over 15 years in prison

Staff Report

A leader of the East Side Money Gang (ESMG) was sentenced last week in federal court in Boston on racketeering, drug trafficking and firearms trafficking charges.

Angel "Stackz" Mejia Zelaya, 24, of Chelsea, was sentenced by U.S. District Court Judge Richard G. Stearns to 188 months in prison and five years of supervised release. In January 2019, Mejia pleaded guilty to one count of conspiracy to conduct enterprise affairs through a pattern of racketeering activity, commonly known as RICO, one count of conspiracy to distribute cocaine and cocaine base, and one count of engaging in the business of dealing in firearms without a license.

tiple shootings, and drug distribution in Chelsea and surrounding communities. Mejia, as well as other members and associates of the gang, were also actively involved in illegally selling firearms, including handguns and shotguns, in and around Chelsea.

Mejia participated in multiple, gang-related shootings.

On July 5, 2015, Mejia was involved in a shooting targeting a rival gang member on a public street in Chelsea, which did not result in the rival gang member being injured. On March 29, 2016, Mejia and his lieutenant, Josue "Superbad" Rodriguez, agreed to provide a .22 caliber revolver to a third ESMG member, Brandon "Big Baby" Baez, so that Baez could "spank" with it – meaning that he could use it against rivals of ESMG. On April 3, 2016, in Revere, Baez used the revolver to attempt to murder two men believed to be members/associates of a rival gang as they sat in a vehicle. Both men were wounded, but not killed. Baez called Mejia immediately after the shooting to inform Mejia that Baez

other ESMG gang members with firearms, including a juvenile who then accidently shot another person.

While Mejia was the leader of the ESMG, the gang dealt substantial quantities of drugs, including cocaine and cocaine base (crack), in Chelsea and surrounding communities. Mejia was responsible for the distribution of at least a kilogram of cocaine base. Mejia and his gang subordinates stored drugs at and distributed drugs from a residence on Tudor Street in Chelsea and another residence in the Chelsea area. The gang kept handguns at both locations to protect their drug operations, as well as for other gang activities.

The prosecution of Mejia arose out of an investigation of various street gangs, including the 18th Street Gang, ESMG and the Boylston Street Gang, which were responsible for fueling a gun and drug pipeline across a number of cities and towns in eastern Massachusetts. During the course of the investigation, more than 70 firearms were seized.




