New commuter rail station to be completed by 2021

Chelsea's new commuter rail station will be bigger, handicap accessible, and should be ready for passengers by the end of 2021.

Representatives the MBTA, as well as the design firm and contractor behind the project, held an informational meeting on the project at City Hall last

It came just one week after Gov. Charlie Baker and a cadre of state and local official celebrated a groundbreaking on the site adjacent to the Market Basket.

City Manager Thomas Ambrosino said the relocated commuter rail station, which will be between Everett Avenue and Third Street and behind the Market Basket, is the second phase of the Silver Line project.

"This project does have some good benefits for the city," said Ambrosino, although he admitted the city has had battles with the MBTA on a number of other transportation issues.

Ambrosino said that while work has just gotten underway, the public meeting on the project was delayed slightly to enhance attendance from a potential summer meeting.

The MBTA's Fiscal and Management Control Board approved a \$32.3 million contract for the project earlier this year.

When complete, the new Chelsea Station will be an intermodal facility that connects the Newburyport/ Rockport Commuter Rail Lines to the Silver Line 3-Chelsea service, which began operating in April 2018.

Vega Maldonado, Tejada advance to District 2 final election in Nov.

Melinda Vega Maldonado and Luis Tejada will face off in the Nov. 5 election for the District 2 seat on the City Council following their 1-2 finishes in Tuesday's Preliminary Election.

Vega Maldonado topped the ticket in the three-candidate field with 89 votes. Tejada, the incumbent District 2 councillor, was second with 58 votes. Attorney Olivia Anne Walsh was third with 32 votes.

Vega Maldonado joined at City Hall for the Maldonado said she was

Council votes to approve using land takings for potential affordable housing

Land the City takes for nonpayment of property taxes could soon be used to bolster Chelsea's affordable housing stock.

At Monday night's meeting, the City Council narrowly passed an order calling for a home rule petition that would give the Council the option to hand those properties over to the City's Affordable Housing Trust Fund Board.

The measure now needs to be approved in the state legislature.

Currently, the City is required to offer up any properties taken for the nonpayment of taxes at auction to the highest bidder. The Council would maintain that option, even if the home rule petition passes.

"The city very rarely takes property for the nonpayment of taxes," said City Manager Tom Ambrosino. He said the City will usually bend over backwards with a property owner to settle the tax issues.

But, Ambrosino

there are instances when the owner walks away from a property, or the City has to step in.

"On the rare occasions when we do have to take ownership by tax title ... the only way to get the property back on the tax rolls is through a public auction," said the City Manager. "Affordable housing (developers) are almost always outbid by for-profit developers."

This move would give

First Housing Court session in Chelsea to start Monday

The ongoing expansion of the state Housing Court will arrive in Chelsea on Monday as the Housing Court has its first session on Monday, Sept. 30 in Chelsea District Court.

For decades, Housing Court has been located in Boston at the Brooke Courthouse, or residents could file in Chelsea District Court. However, Chelsea Court didn't have the specialty services that Housing Court delivers, such as mediation sessions, and if residents couldn't get to the Brooke, they often lost out.

That is not the case anymore, as Housing Court Chief Justice Tim Sullivan and Deputy Court Administrator Benjamin O. Adeyinka (also a Chelsea resident) announced they are ready to bring the court to the peo-

"We will being our Chelsea session on Sept. 30 and every Monday thereafter as long as it works," said Sullivan this week. "We believe if you build it, they will come. We believe is we establish a presence then the litigants will make use of the services. We think it's going to be much more convenient, especially to people who feel constrained by transportation."

The Court sessions will begin in Courtroom 2 in Chelsea, with Judge Marylou Muirhead presiding. They will also bring a Clerk Magistrate and a team of housing specialists - which includes mediation. Most of those on the team will also be bi-lingual as well.

The bulk of Housing Court business is summary process cases, which is basically evictions. There were 507 of those filed in Chelsea District Court last year, and Adeyinka said they are expecting that number to be about the same in the first year of operation of their

Commission on Disability established with Council vote

A new commission approved by the City Council Monday night aims to improve access in the city for people with disabilities.

The Council vote adopts a Massachusetts General Law allowing for the creation of a Commission on Disability.

"As far as I can tell, the City has never had a Commission on Disability," stated City Manager Thomas Ambrosino in a letter to the Council. "Such commissions are beneficial to a municipality."

The commission assists cities and towns in ensuring compliance with state and federal laws that affect people with disabilities and often makes recommendations about new policies that help meet the needs of disabled residents, Ambrosino stated. In addition, the existence of a disability commission is often necessary when applying for state and federal grants that fund infrastructure improvements to establish Americans with

Disabilities Act compliant buildings.

"I think this is badly needed in this city," said District 1 Councillor Robert Bishop, adding that he had recently visited a new McDonald's in the city and was surprised to find there were handicap accessibility

issues. •In other business, the Council approved the appropriation of \$1.3 million in Chapter 70 state funding

for the school budget. During the public speaking portion of the Council meeting, Supt. Mary Bourque and School Committeewoman Yessenia Alfaro-Alvarez were those who urged the Council okay the

funding. "The money is needed in our schools to put back cuts that were made," said Bour-

Chelsea receives \$361K to improve CHS street layouts

Not one year has gone by and Chelsea has already received a lucrative grant to help make the streets around Chelsea High School safer for pedestrians, cyclists and

The conflicted and complicated area features drivers coming off the highway, freight trucks, kids walking to school and bicyclists traveling across the community. The Baker Administration announced this month that Chelsea would receive \$361,364 to help make safety improvements.

Planner Alex Train said after the Council passed the new Complete Streets ordinance last year, the City did an inventory of dangerous intersections and corridors.

First on the list was the Carter Street and Everett Avenue areas around the high school.

"A priority was Chelsea High School and it was first on the list," he said. "There's a lot of students that traverse by there every day. They go down Beech and across Carter every day. It's just not optimal for walking.'

The project includes installation of new pedestrian signal equipment, including pedestrian push buttons and countdown signal heads, bicycle route signs and bi-


"There is a disturbing trend where I feel that a proper evaluation is not being done on some of our larger properties," said

Frank Astone, project manager from design engineers AECOM, said the new station will be fully handicap accessible, with high-level platforms four feet above the tracks. This will allow level boarding for all commuters, Astone said.

In addition, there will be new canopies, emergency call boxes, new signage, and an extensive lighting system on the platform.

"We want to make sure people feel safe and secure," said Astone.

While the design specifics of the project have been part of the public record for several months, there was a significant focus during last week's meeting on the anticipated construction

"During construction, we have to maintain commuter rail service," said Astone. "That's why it is going to take 2 1/2-years for construction. We need to keep the trains running at all times."

However, due to the nature of the work, Astone said there up to six weekend outages that will be announced ahead of time to facilitate specialized construction.

During those weekend outages, the MBTA will bus passengers between Lynn and North Station.

Partial roadway closures will be minimal, typically for utility and paving work at railroad grade crossings, with police details in place.

Astone also said there is a small possibility for full roadway closures during the replacement of the grade crossings, with detours that will be coordinated with the city.

Several residents questioned how the commuter rail construction will be integrated with other largescale projects in Chelsea.

"There is a lot of activity taking place behind Market Basket, so there will be less of an impact than there is for some of the projects," said Ambrosino. "Most of the impact will be out of the way, in some sense."

There were also questions about how MBTA bus service outside of the Silver Line would be incorporated into the new commuter rail station schedule. Several residents noted that the 111 bus stops very close to the current commuter rail station, and asked if the bus route would be adjusted to stop near the new station.

MBTA project manager Dan Beaulieu noted that he could not speak definitively on the bus issue, but would check with the proper offi-Parking near the new

station also came up, with suggestions that the MBTA look into an agreement with Market Basket to use their property for some parking spaces. "We have started conver-

sations with their real estate company regarding parking, and we will discuss it further," said Beaulieu Over the next two years,

Ambrosino said there will continue to be meetings between the city and the MBTA addressing many of the issues raised last week.

"I recognize there are a lot of unanswered questions with respect to this construction on the operations side, and those have to be solved over the next two years," said the City

Kennedy announces bid for Senate candidacy

In front of a standing-room only crowd at the East Boston Social Centers, U.S. Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy III announce his candidacy for the U.S. Senate taking on incumbent U.S. Sen. Ed Markey.

After touching on the Kennedy Family's roots in East Boston--his greatgreat-great-grandfather Patrick Kennedy immigrated from Ireland to Eastie in the mid-1800s--Kennedy laid out his vision for his U.S. Senate run. "I know that, like my

family, there are millions of others that are here, that believe in that chance," said Kennedy. "That strive for that moment to provide for their families, and build a better future for the place that they call home. And I know that through fate, but often times through choices made by this country, by our government, that those barriers have been erected, not taken down. That far too many dreams have been blocked or deferred, rather than realized."

Kennedy said he runs to tear down a system that has marginalized millions of people in the U.S.

"I know that for the first time in modern American history, we have a President that is actively trying to make that harder. We have a Senate that instead of trying to harness the opportunity and potential of every person in this country, they're trying to pull us back," he said. "And I'm running for the United States Senate to tear that down, to fight back, with everything we've got."

Appealing to the liberal crowd Kennedy said President Donald Trump has forced a reckoning in our nation but to meet this moment requires more than just defeating him.

"It requires taking on, clearly, a broken system that calcified structures that allowed him to win in the first place," he said. "The daily acts of oppression and injustice that enabled 63 million Americans to think that he was a better steward of their dreams and hopes and aspirations. Our country deserves better. We deserve more."

Kennedy said people deserve an economic justice where a hard day's work means an honest day's pay.

"Where you can provide for your family. Where a Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy III greets supporters as he

announces his Senate candidacy last Saturday.

health care system means that you can get access to the health care that you need when you need it," he said. "Where people can afford to live in the cities that they call home, the cities that they power. Where we have an immigration policy that is reflective of our humanity and makes our nation stronger. Kennedy added that the challenge is far too urgent for him to sit and wait for somebody else to take it on--a nod to some Markey supporters that think Kennedy should 'wait his turn' to run

"And I have asked people to do more, to hold on, to fight back a bit stronger, to give every little bit that they've got. And so I will too, and I hope that you will join me, for every single day, to prove that the way you fight back against the politics of "you can't," against the politics of division, against the politics of doubt about what we can do as a country, is to bring every voice in, to lift every voice, and to believe that if you have a country as good as the people it serves that nothing will get in the

way of what we can do."

Most summary process cases go before the judge, and then are sent to special mediators who try to sort out a resolution between the tenant and landlord. That does the trick most times, but if not, the case can come back before the judge. If a trial is required, that would still have to happen in Boston where they can seat a 12-person jury. Likewise, any pre-trial conferences and initial case filings would be taking place in Boston.

Cell phones are not allowed in Chelsea Court, though they are allowed in the Brooke - it should be

The expansion comes out of legislation passed in 2017 that allowed for the Housing Court to move into different areas, some places with new buildings and others with shared facilities like in Chelsea.

"Prior to 2017, there were still 84 cities and towns in the Commonwealth without any access to our court," said Sullivan. "Interestingly, even though we began in Boston and Boston is in Suffolk County, no other Suffolk County communities were included. We believe if we can, we should immerse ourselves in the community...From my standpoint, one great aspect of Housing Court expansion is many communities we're picking up include large numbers

of rental units. Chelsea is certainly no exception. Our court can really serve that population in a very beneficial way."

Another positive is for the City to be able to file Code Compliance cases with the Housing Court, including compliance for the building, sanitary and fire codes. That is a great aspect of the new Housing Court, and one that City officials were excited to use.

Sullivan said they are also trying to work with the Bar Association to implement a Lawyer for a Day program to provide assistance to the many litigants that show up without repre-

He said he has been extremely impressed with the cooperation from the Trial Courts and all of the community stakeholders in Chelsea.

"None of this could have happened without all of them," said Sullivan.

LET'S KEEP IN MIND THE **FACTS ABOUT HEALTH CARE COSTS IN** THIS COUNTRY

The issue of national health care is now front and center in the debate among the presidential candidates of both parties, with each offering their vision of what should be done about this important issue.

Some favor a repeal of Obamacare, some wish to improve upon it, and still others want to implement a "Medicare for all" system.

However, regardless of where one stands on the issue, it is important to keep in mind some basic facts about the costs of the present health care system in this country.

The United States presently spends far more on health care than any other nation in the world. Our health care costs amount to a whopping 17 percent of our gross national product, compared to 10 percent for countries in Europe and elsewhere that offer national health insurance. Ironically however, despite our huge expenditures, we rate near the bottom among developed nations in every category of measures of national health.

Moreover, gaps in our present health insurance system either leave many uncovered or underinsured. As a result, millions of Americans go bankrupt or become impoverished every year when faced with a catastrophic illness because they lack adequate health insurance.

Job mobility, which is a significant factor in the ability of employees to improve their financial circumstances, is hindered because of the lack of a uniform national health insurance system. The fear of losing their existing health insurance prevents millions of Americans from either taking a new job or starting their own business. Study after study has shown that our economy is being weighed down by the burden of a health insurance system that is inefficient and inflexible.

The costs of a Medicare-for-all system frequently are cited by those opposed to a national health insurance plan, but that is only one side of the equation.

The profits of the health insurance industry, about \$20 billion annually, are cited by proponents of Medicare-forall, but think about this figure: The gross revenues of the health insurance industry are about \$500 billion. In other words, a half a trillion dollars is being spent annually in our health care system for a product that contributes nothing to anybody's health or well-being, other than increasing the wealth of the shareholders of the health insurance industry.

In short, Medicare-for-all in nations throughout the world is both more cost-efficient and produces better overall health outcomes for the citizens of those countries compared to the U.S.

When the various candidates discuss their solutions to the health-care crisis in our country, every voter should keep those two facts uppermost in mind.

mates for August: • The state's August total unemployment rate remained at 2.9 percent, the Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Develop-

ment announced Sept. 20. • The Bureau of Labor Statistics' preliminary job estimates indicate Massachusetts gained 7,100 jobs in August. Over the month, the private sector added 6,700 jobs as gains occurred in Professional, Scientific and Business Services: Construction: Information; Financial Activities; and Other Services. Manufacturing jobs level remained unchanged over the month. Government added 400 jobs over the month.

•From August 2018 to August 2019, BLS estimates Massachusetts added 43,600 jobs.

•The August unemployment rate was eight-tenths of a percentage point lower than the national rate of 3.7 percent reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

the City Council discretion to auction property to the highest bidder, or give it to the Affordable Housing Trust Fund Board, which could dispense of the property for affordable housing development.

Several councillors opposed the order, stating that the move would either limit income to the City, or further erode the Council's powers.

"The City Manager states that it is rare that this happens, but it does happen," said District 1 Councillor Robert Bishop, adding that there were several properties that went to auction a few years ago and brought in top dollar.

"I don't think there is anything wrong with going to the highest bidder," said Bishop.

District 3 Councillor Joe Perlatonda said his concerns stemmed from more power away from the City

Council, noting that recent

city charter changes took away parking, traffic, and licensing duties from the Council.

"This is a tough situation, but I have to vote 'no," said Perlatonda.

But Councillor-At-Large Leo Robinson said the order does not diminish Council power.

"All this does is give us another tool we can use and an opportunity to control the property," said Robin-


