Over the past sixteen years, Giuffrida has been instrumental in developing and managing hundreds of programs, camps, and events that serve residents and visitors of all ages for the City of Revere. Beginning as a Site Coordinator for Revere Public Schools' after-school and summer programs. Gi-

Council to take up police and fire union contracts

The city council held a quick special summer meeting last week to take care of some timely business, including moving two union contract agreements to its ways and

means subcommittee. City Manager Fidel Maltez is requesting that the council approve new contracts for the Chelsea Police Superior Officers union and the Chelsea Firefighters union.

Maltez is also requesting that the council approve the cost items associated with the settled contracts.

The major cost items of the agreement with the Police Superior Officers union are the annual raises for fiscal years 2025 FY25 to FY27. through 2027.

The contract calls for a 4 percent raise for FY25, a 4 percent raise for FY26, and a 3 percent raise for

"In addition, in FY27 there will be a 1% increase to hazardous duty pay," stated Maltez. "The total cost of the contract over the three years is approximately \$970,000."

Maltez stated that a request to transfer funds from the salary reserve line will be presented to cover the approximately \$173,000 FY25 salary cost in the fall.

The annual raises for the firefighters union will match those laid out in the Police Superior Officers union over the course of

"In addition, in FY27, there will be a change in the calculation method for the night differential rate," stated Maltez. The total cost of the

contract over three years is approximately \$2.3 million, Maltez said.

"Since the contract takes effect July 1 and the major cost items are accounted for in the FY25 budget, a request to transfer funds from the Salary Reserve line will be presented to cover the approximately \$370,000 FY25 salary cost in the fall," stated Maltez.

In other business, the council approved the warrant for the state primaries to be held on Tuesday. Sept. 3.

City provides update on Washington Avenue fire

Due to the extensive damage caused by the sixalarm fire at 185 Washington Ave. last week, the Chelsea Fire Department was unable to determine the exact cause of the fire.

Nearly 60 people were displaced as a result of the fire on Wednesday, August 14 in what was one of the most destructive residential fires in the city in years. Local fire officials are encouraging residents to remain vigilant and take precautions to prevent fires, and note that there is information on fire prevention resources at chelseama.gov.

Since the fire, the City,

community partners, and state agencies have mobilized to support the families with hotel lodging, cash donations for basic needs, and meals for each day since the incident. Additional support includes the Recovery Resource Center that was hosted on Friday, August 16, at La Colaborativa and the Housing Clinic hosted by The Neighborhood Developers on Monday, August

As of Tuesday, residents were scheduled to check out from the original hotel with the option of an extended hotel stay for up to two weeks if they are unable to stay with family or find a housing

alternative. All impacted families have met with state officials and those that qualify have been given the option to enter the emergency assistance shelter system supported by the Commonwealth, according to city officials.

City Manager Fidel Maltez stated that the city is grateful to the Chelsea Fire Department, Office of Emergency Management, the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency, Salvation Army, Red Cross, La Colaborativa, the Neighborhood Developers, and other local organizations that assembled to collaborate and support the Chelsea families.

Chelsea man pleads guilty in 2021 stabbing death of his wife

A Chelsea man will serve at least 25 years in prison after pleading guilty last week to stabbing his wife more than 40 times in 2021 before severely injuring himself, according to Suffolk County District Attorney Kevin Hayden.

Mario Mira 51, pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in the December 11, 2021 death of his estranged wife, Paula Andrea Ortiz, 47, at her Chelsea apartment. Judge Mary Ames sentenced Mira to life in prison, with parole eligibility after 25

Members of the Chelsea Police Department responded to the victim's Stockton Street apartment at approximately 4:21 p.m. on December 11, 2021. There, they located Ortiz, who had suffered multiple stab and slash wounds. She was pronounced dead at the scene.

Responders also located Mira at the apartment. He was transported to Massachusetts General Hospital with life-threatening wounds and was eventually arraigned in his hospital bed. A knife and a boxcutter were found near Mira.

Several of Ortiz's relatives, including her sister, Ana Ortiz, and 17-yearold daughter, Maria Paz Ortiz, delivered victim impact statements at last week's sentencing.

"It's been almost three years of constant panic attacks, PTSD, nightmares, depression, days of not getting out of bed, days where I'm mad at the world and wonder who to blame," stated Maria Paz Ortiz. "I've never really felt okay but I forced myself to find peace. I had no other option, I'm still angry at my dad, but I don't hate him. But now I have to explain to my kids why grandpa and grandma aren't with us, I have to retell my story thousands of

"I still have so many questions, but they will probably go unanswered," she continued. "I do wish my dad had thought about us, but I guess these are things anger can do to Hayden praised the sur-

vivors for sharing their emotions at the sentenc-"These moving and

heartbreaking words spo-

ken by the people who knew and loved Paula Andrea Ortiz encompass all of the tragedy and cruelty and endless sorrow of domestic violence, and this case was as sad and tragic as any domestic violence case gets," Hayden said.

Chelsea man arrested in connection with bank robberies in JP and Hyde Park

Special to the Record A Chelsea man was ar-

rested last week in connection with the armed robberies of banks in Weymouth, Jamaica Plain and Hyde Park. Keywan Kelly, 29, was charged with three counts of armed bank robbery. According to

charging documents from the U.S. Attorney's Office, at approximately 11:52 a.m. on July 1, 2024, a male - later allegedly identified as Kelly – entered a Bank of America branch in Weymouth wearing gloves and a medical mask. Kelly allegedly approached a teller window and pushed a handwritten note towards the teller demanding \$20,000 and threatened that he would "kill you all," while pointing a firearm at the teller.

It is alleged that the teller then handed Kelly \$15,000, after which Kelly demanded more and the teller gave him addition-

al cash of approximately

\$4,000 to \$5,000 before

leaving the bank. During

the robbery, Kelly alleged-

ly made verbal threats such as, "Run that s**t before I blow this place up" and "I'll kill all of you."

Similarly, at approxi-

mately 1:41 p.m. on July 16, 2024, a male - later allegedly identified as Kelly – entered the Rockland Trust Bank in Jamaica Plain wearing a black balaclava style mask, black clothing and white latex gloves. Kelly allegedly approached the teller window and handed the teller a note that read, "I need 20K no DyPacks I have 4 bombs I'll Kill everyone make quick," while brandishing a firearm. Kelly allegedly fled the bank on foot after receiving approximately \$2,480 in cash from the It is further alleged that,

at approximately 10:09 a.m. on July 26, 2024, a male - later allegedly identified as Kelly - entered another Rockland Trust Bank branch in Hyde Park, again wearing a black balaclava style

mask and gloves. There,

Kelly allegedly handed the

teller a handwritten note that included words to the effect of, "you're being robbed give me cash," before pointing a firearm at the teller. It is alleged that Kelly verbally threatened to "shoot" and demanded \$20,000. Upon receiving approximately \$3,000 in cash, Kelly took back the demand note and fled the A subsequent investigation allegedly identified

Kelly on the Weymouth bank's video surveillance and identified Kelly's fingerprints on the vehicle used as a getaway car following the Weymouth robbery. The investigation also allegedly revealed connections between Kelly and vehicles that were identified as being in the vicinity of the Jamaica Plain and Hyde Park banks at the time of the robberies. Cell phone location data allegedly revealed that Kelly's cell phone was present in the vicinity of each of the banks near the time of the robberies. according to the U.S. Attorney's Office.



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DiDomenico announces passage of largest housing investment in State history

Massachusetts Legislature has passed the Affordable Homes Act, the largest housing investment in Massachusetts history and a powerful first step in tackling the state's housing affordability crisis. On August 6th, Governor Healey signed this historic bill into law.

The legislation authorizes \$5.16 billion in bond authorizations and tax credits to spur housing production in Massachusetts, while implementing sweeping policy initiatives to facilitate the development of affordable housing and preserve public housing in Massachu-

"I am excited to see this transformative investment addressing the housing crisis pass through the legislature and signed into law," said Senator DiDomenico, Assistant Majority Leader of the Massachusetts Senate. "This bill will repair and create housing, help countless individuals find the home they need, and ensure people can continue to live in the community they have lived in their entire lives. I want to thank Governor Healey, Senate President Spilka, Senator Rodrigues, and Senator Edwards for bringing this ambitious plan to life and shepherding it through the legislative process."

properties, the bill makes project sponsors eligible for a tax credit of up to 10 percent of the development costs upon completion of a project. The bill includes a new

tax credit to incentivize production of homeownership units targeting households with incomes of up to 120 per cent of the area median income (AMI). It also makes permanent the Community Investment Tax Credit (CITC) while expanding the statewide cap on donations from \$12 million to \$15 million. Further, it extends the sunset of the Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit through December 31, 2030, while increasing the total available amount from \$55 million to \$110 million.

Among the many policy initiatives included in the bill to create more housing is a provision to permit accessory dwelling unit (ADU) equal to or less than 900 square feet to be built by-right on a property in single-family zoning districts in all Massachusetts communities. The bill further provides consumer protections to help prevent homeowners from being pressured into waiving a home inspection, protects tenants who have a years-old eviction record from having that record held against them when securing new housing, gives seasonal communities new tools to tackle their unique housing challenges, and protects renters from having their unit redeveloped into a condominium.

Bond authorizations include:

Public housing

- \$2 billion to support the repair, rehabilitation, and modernization of over 43,000 public housing units across Massachusetts, with 25 per cent of the funds dedicated to preserve housing for those with incomes below 30 percent AMI.
- \$150 million to decarbonize the public housing stock and \$15 million for accessibility upgrades.
- \$200 million to support Local Housing Authorities (LHAs)

partner with developers to add mixed-income developments on LHA land, leveraging funds to maintain and preserve public housing while increasing the overall housing sup-

Housing vulnerable populations

- \$200 million to support innovative and alternative forms of rental housing, including single person occupancy (SPO) units, transitional and permanent housing for people experiencing homelessness, housing for seniors and veterans, and transitional units for persons recovering from substance use disorder. 25 per cent of funds must be used to fund projects which preserve housing for those with incomes below 30 per cent AMI.
- \$70 million to support the development of appropriate community-based housing for Department of Mental Health (DMH) and Department of Developmental Services (DDS) clients
- \$60 million to modify homes of individuals or families with disabilities or seniors so that they may maintain residency or return home from institutional settings.
 - \$55 million to support

people with disabilities who are not DMH or DDS clients.

- \$800 million for the Affordable Housing Trust Fund which provides resources to create or preserve affordable housing for households earning less than 100 per cent of

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THANK YOU, ATTORNEY GENERAL CAMPBELL

We'd like to express our congratulations, and thanks, to Mass. Attorney General Andrea Campbell for her efforts in securing the recent landmark \$600 million settlement with the major tobacco product companies. In addition to the \$600 payment this year, the agreement calls for the companies to make annual payments in the years ahead.

This settlement comes on the heels of a comprehensive agreement Campbell's office reached last year with JUUL, the e-cigarette manufacturer, whose products have proven attractive to our nation's youth to such an extent that an estimated two million middle school and high school students used those highly-addictive nicotine devices in 2023 alone.

These and previous agreements seek to hold the tobacco manufacturers accountable for their marketing practices that directly have targeted our nation's youth for decades (remember the infamous Joe Camel ads from the late 1980s?) with the express goal of churning out successive new generations of nicotine addicts.

The direct harm caused by tobacco products, whether they be cigarettes, cigars, e-cigarettes, tobacco leaves, or chewing tobacco, have long made them the greatest single source of public health problems in our country for generations, including lung cancer, throat cancer, emphysema, high-blood pressure, and cardiovascular disease. In fact, despite all of the progress we have made in reducing tobacco use in our country, lung cancer remains the leading cause of cancer deaths among both men and women in the United States and tobacco use is linked to 400,000 deaths in the U.S. each year.

Tobacco use also has a hidden and even more pernicious effect: Contrary to popular belief that existed for decades that marijuana was a "gateway" drug leading to stronger drug use, studies conducted both in England and in this country (by the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health) have shown that it is cigarette smoking at a young age that is most-predictive of a person's risk of using illegal drugs later in life.

For our part, we take great satisfaction in the seachange in the way that society views the use of tobacco products. Our newspapers won awards in the early and mid-1990s from the New England Press Assoc. and the Mass. Press Assoc. for our investigative stories and editorials regarding the ways in which local boards of health thwarted public health initiatives regarding tobacco use in public places. We also were honored by the Mass. Cancer Society in two successive years for our advocacy urging federal, state, and local leaders to recognize the need to regulate tobacco use in our society.

We applaud Attorney General Campbell for her efforts in bringing the tobacco companies to heel for the damage they have done to so many families in our country. Although the hundreds of millions of dollars from these settlements will not bring back any of our loved ones who suffered and died prematurely because of their tobacco use, hopefully the funds will educate future generations to prevent them from becoming addicted to tobacco products of any kind.

A GREAT SUMMER FOR THE GARDEN

Thanks to our mild winter, this past spring season was the most glorious in many years in our area. The early profusion of daffodils and tulips was followed by a gorgeous display of flowering crabapple trees, magnolias, and dogwoods, as well as our azaleas and rhododendrons, which bloomed fully and profusely.

This also was the best season we can remember for our hydrangeas, which benefited from the lack of winter cold-snaps that can prove lethal for the vulnerable tips of the plant that are the blossom. (We use an anti-desiccant spray on ours in order to provide some protection from winter's chill, but even that does not shield them when temperatures plunge into the single digits, which we avoided this past winter.)

However, the best part of our gardening efforts have come with the bounteous harvest of our tomatoes and other vegetables over the past six weeks. We planted our seedlings the weekend before Memorial Day, with the cherry tomatoes ripening in the first week of July. These days we only have a small patio in front of our condo, so we plant all of our veggies in large containers (which have the added benefit of keeping them out of the reach of the rabbits), but we have had more tomatoes, both cherries and the big ones, as well as cucumbers and summer squash, than we ever have had in our decades of growing vegetables.

So yes, climate change, which is bringing us warmer ocean and air temperatures and milder winters, is not a good thing. But we have to admit that our delicious tomatoes, which taste just so much better when they come fresh from the garden than anything you can buy in a store and which benefit from our record-setting hot and humid summers, bring us a simple yet profound joy each and every day.

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Prattville Voice Studio is about expression and bringing out the best in people

In the parlor of her pastel yellow, Prattville home - with its wooden porch swing and encircling, lush garden -- Marsha Johnson practices a piece that she performs along with a small chorus during Sunday mass at the First Baptist Church, in Woburn. As her fingers press upon the keys of her concert grand Steinway piano, the dangling prisms of a vintage, crystal lamp sitting atop the piano's lid sway imperceptibly from the vibrations of the gospel

That whimsical space -- where she and her conductor and composhusband, Herman Weiss, have shared for 27 years -- is abundant with shelves of sheet music. The living room is decorated with hand-sewn, bird-patterned tropical curtains that embellish the seven-foot-tall windows, and hang from a rod that Johnson cleverly constructed from PVC pipes and fabric-covered

tennis ball finials. A harp that Johnson painted with leaves and pink and purple flowers sits at the far end of the piano. This is Prattville Voice Studio, where Johnson offers one-on-one voice lessons to teenage and adult students.

"I am ready and eager to teach," says Johnson, a professional, classical singer. "It's individualized, based on the person's language, whether they're doing an audition, a solo, or they've had lessons and want polish."

Johnson believes that posture is crucial to projecting one's voice; and that one's body will provide a singer with as much breath as a phrase requires. She instructs students to balance their bodies so

that they are completely relaxed. Johnson advises them to keep their backs straight, align themselves for ease of motion, raise their chests, and rest their arms beside them as they take a natural breath.

"The person really teaches themselves, and the teacher is there to guide," explains Johnson. "I have a particular meth-

od based on Blair McClosky. It is about postural balance and relaxation, so the body does all the work. If you put tension in your body, you put tension in the [vocal] cords."

The most gratifying moment for Johnson as a music teacher is seeing her students succeed, and their revelations when they begin to understand her lessons and techniques.

"The philosophy is about expression and bringing out the best in people. It's about being authentic as a singer," Johnson describes. "It's about finding the repertoire that suites your voice."

Johnson earned a degree in voice from Whittenberg University, in Springfield, Ohio, where she grew up. She also attended the New England Conservatory, where she earned a master's degree in voice, in addition to her master's in expressive music therapy from Lesley University.

A pioneer in the field, Johnson has helped people heal through music therapy for 30 years. She worked for the state of Massachusetts, serving individuals with intellectual disabilities, and provided hospice music therapy for residents of Chelsea Jewish Lifecare.

"I was providing music and drawing them together through socialization, and playing drums and piano," says Johnson, who studied neurological music therapy. "It builds new neural pathways for people with strokes, autism, and Parkinson's."

Johnson and Weiss, congregational members of Temple Emmanuel, can be heard playing piano and singing with the rabbi during Jewish high holidays. Johnson hopes to perform locally at library concert series, and will be in a recital at the First Baptist Church, Woburn, this fall.

Start the school year strong and prevent illness in children

(StatePoint) The excitement of a new school year unfolds each year when families flood the superstore aisles to buy classroom supplies, tape afterschool schedules on the fridge and organize carpools with friends.

Common to each family is a desire for children to remain healthy, active and ready to learn.

As of June 13, 2024, a total of 151 U.S. measles cases were reported this year-to-date in 21 different states, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. These recent measles outbreaks have affected unvaccinated people. Choosing to not vaccinate your children not only leaves them susceptible to measles, but also exposes other children to this potentially serious disease. This includes infants who are too young to be vaccinated and those who are unto other health conditions.

"Everyone in our community deserves to be healthy, and part of being healthy means getting immunized for all illnesses, including influenza and COVID-19 and, if eligible, respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). It benefits all of us if every child in our community is vaccinated, because it means that all of us are more likely to be healthy," says Dr. Higgins.

Families can also stop the spread of infection by encouraging hand washing with children throughout the day. Help or remind them to wash their hands:

Before eating (including snacks)

• After a trip to the bath-

- Whenever they come in from playing outdoors
- After touching an animal, like a family pet
- After sneezing or coughing if they cover their mouth
- When someone in the household is ill

The AAP calls for the immunization of all children and adolescents according to its policy, Recommended Immunization Schedules for Children and Adolescents Aged 18 Years or Younger, United States. More information can be found at healthychildren.org.

"Your pediatrician can answer any questions about recommended vaccines and when your child needs them," Dr. Higgins







Over 250 schools and playgrounds

ensure all schools and playgrounds are safe from methane gas leaks, Mothers Out Front, Conservation Law Foundation (CLF), Boston Parks Advocates, GreenRoots, and eight individuals have announced plans to sue National Grid for both federal and state law violations on gas leaks and tree protections.

"Dangerous and potentially explosive gas is actively leaking near 258 schools and playgrounds in Boston and Chelsea," shared Tania Castro-Daunais. Castro-Daunais is a Mothers Out Front Member Leader who lives in East Boston, where active leaks are occurring near Excel Academy Charter School and eight parks and playgrounds. "We cannot continue to put our children and communities at risk. National Grid can't continue putting Band-Aids on its aging pipelines. They must take action to protect our kids and invest in electric energy, an energy source that is cleaner and safer for our

kids and communities." As of June 30, 2024, 46 of the 195 schools in Boston and Chelsea were within 350 feet of gas leaks. Additionally, 212 of 537 parks and playgrounds in Boston were within 350 feet of a gas leak, and one park in Chelsea was also within this distance of a gas leak. "Utility companies advise people to move at least 350 feet away from any suspected gas leak, so it is unconscionable to see this many gas leaks near places where our children spend so much time," said Sonja Tengblad, an East Boston mom whose 6-year-old son often plays at six of the eight East Boston parks near gas leaks. Tengblad is also the Founder and Co-Coordinator of Mothers Out Front's East Boston Team. "By allowing gas to continue leaking this close to where our children learn and play, National Grid is creating unnecessary risks to our community's health, safety and well-being. We all need and deserve cleaner energy in

our communities." "Mothers Out Front was founded in Massachusetts on the conviction that there is no more powerful force for change than mothers mobilizing to protect their children," said Beth Shipp, Executive Director of Mothers Out Front. "Our moms have been fighting gas leaks in the Boston-area since 2015. It is time for National Grid to join us and commit to no longer exposing children to toxic and explosive fumes."

to the two kitchenette areas, and the administrative office spaces on the second floor. Every inch of the two-story, 20,000-square foot building will be part of what Furnari calls "the total transformation" of the well-known home to ROCA. All areas of the building will be ADA-compliant.

"We're excited about this project," said Furnari. "We've been a mainstay in the Chelsea area for 36 years. We're very proud to have our headquarters in the city. The investment we're making into the building is for the future for the young people and to continue to stay and work with the City of Chelsea and the surrounding communities."

A warm and welcoming space

Furnari said the new building will create a space that "will be safe, welcoming and inviting to our young people."

"Our building is safe, and we want to make sure that our young people feel safe and comfortable here," said Furnari. "There will be a new flow to the building. For example, what used to be the town center, our main gathering and function area, we're going to transition into where the gymnasium was," explained Furnari. "Everything will be accessible, cheerful, and welcoming."

Furnari expects the renovation project to be completed by December at which time a grand opening ceremony will be held for the community.

During the renovation project, Roca is operating at three temporary sites in Chelsea on Second Street, Everett Avenue, and Arlington Street.

"We also have a wonderful architectural out of Cambridge called ARC which is led by Victor Agran and his team, and they are pro bono," Furnari added. "They've [ARC Architects] helped us with three other projects prior to this one, and they understand what Roca is all about, understand the services we provide to young people in need, and the programmatic work that's going into the site. The site's been totally revamped to identify areas for more programmatic space to hold training sessions in the extension of our CBT [Cognitive Behavioral Theory) team.

The building is going to be more conducive to young people and to our staff in the training we have for our cities and towns."

Benefits of massage

By Penny & Ed Cherubino

Ah, there is nothing more relaxing than a great massage! If the massage is gentle and loving, your dog or cat might agree. What's more, if petting your animals is relaxing for you, massaging might even be a better way to spend time together and improve your bond.

Getting to Know You!

Writing on the Modern Dog website, Lola Michelin provides an excellent description of a 10-minute maintenance massage: "Use a flat palm to slowly touch all the parts of your dog's body. Really focus on what you are feeling and pay attention to all the layers, from hair through skin, fat, muscle, and down to bone."

She explains how this lets you know your dog or cat's body and "...to notice any differences in surface temperature, sensitivity to touch, localized swelling or muscle tension, poor

coat quality or tight skin."

Once you know what's expected, you can spot what has changed and will be better able to communicate to your veterinarian what you want them to check.

Massage Calms We used massage when

we were doing a lot of fostering. Dogs entering foster homes are frightened and unsure of what will happen next. They must try to fit into a new routine in a new setting with strange people and other animals.

Over the years, we've

used Tellington TTouch massage on our dogs and with some of the skittish rescue pups we've fostered. Mardi Richmond described the classic TTouch massage in an article in Whole Dog Journal, explaining that "... your fingers are slightly curved, and you use the pads of your fingers to create the circles." She has found this "particularly

useful for anxious dogs."

How well does it work? Our vet was concerned because Poppy's heart rate was so low on the exam table. We had a quick explanation. While we waited for our appointment, Poppy was on Penny's lap getting a half-hour mas-

When to Apply Touch Therapy

A reassuring touch in a scary setting like a veterinary office may help calm an anxious animal. However, this will only work for critters who are receptive to it. Trained experts in TTouch may be able to work with reluctant and highly agitated dogs, but most of us have to choose which dogs we massage with foresight and knowledge of their personalities.

How do you tell if the dog is willing? Start with a few gentle rubs. If the pup settles in and seems to enjoy it, continue. Some dogs will lean into anyone willing to give them some




