## Council honors residents for their service

The city council honored two devoted residents with celebratory resolutions at the beginning of its meeting on Monday night.

Juan Carlos Morales, an Army veteran and the city's assistant veterans' agent, was recognized for his role in helping residents during a six-alarm fire on Washington Avenue in August.

On the morning of August 14, Morales went into the burning building at 185 Washington Ave. to alert residents to evacuate.

"Undeterred by heavy fire and smoke conditions, Juan Carlos went door-to-door to ensure every resident was warned and able to safely evacuate," the resolution stated. "In addition to his initial efforts, Juan Carlos displayed unparalleled bravery by re-entering the building to rescue an elderly man who remained on the third floor, locating and bringing the individual to safety."

Councilor-at-Large Leo Robinson praised Morales for his life saving efforts in August, as well as his overall dedication to the "I have worked with him over the past several years putting together Veterans Day and Memorial Day, and he just has an outstanding character," said Robinson.

District 8 Councilor Calvin Brown thanked Morales for his deduction and for being in the right place at the right time.

District 4 Councilor Tanairi Garcia noted that she went to kindergarten with Morales in Chelsea.

"It is an honor to have you here and to an honor to have you still a resident of Chelsea and a hero," said Garcia.

The council also pre-

sented a celebratory resolution to Dr. Dean Xerras, who intends to retire from the board of health when he completes his current term. Xerras has served on the board since 2006.

A graduate of Tufts University School of Medicine, Xerras has practiced general medicine at MGH Chelsea since 2002 and has served as its medical director since 2009. In addition, Xerras is an assistant professor of medicine at Harvard Medical School and is active in teaching MGH residents.

## CHS seniors awarded prestigious QuestBridge Scholarship

It was a noteworthy December for Chelsea High School seniors Alma Alla '25, Brandon Ossa Barrientos '25 and Diana "Yuli" Salinas Garcia '25, who learned this month that they were awarded the QuestBridge National College Match Scholarship, a full four-year scholarship that covers the cost of attendance including tuition, housing, food, books and supplies and travel expenses.

Alma will be attending Tufts University, Brandon will be attending Wesleyan University and Diana will be attending Amherst College. Out of the 25,500 applicants for the Quest-Bridge scholarship nationwide, the Chelsea High School triumvirate were among 2,627 QuestBridge Match Scholarship Recipients. Only 10.1 percent of QuestBridge scholarship applicants were named recipients.

"I plan on majoring in biochemistry and following the Pre-Dental Track at Tufts! The QuestBridge application was rigorous, stressful, and rewarding. When I learned that I was matched, I felt a mixture

## FY25 property tax rates come in lower than initially estimated

Chelsea taxpayers are looking at some positive news on the property tax rates for Fiscal Year 2025.

The rate was recently certified by the state's Bureau of Accounts, Department of Revenue. The residential rate for FY25 is \$11.51 per \$1,000 of valuation, while the commercial-industrial rate is \$24.03.

"These approved rates vary from the estimated tax rates that were part of our tax rate presentation on October 28, where the

residential rate was estimated to be \$11.48 per thousand, and the commercial-industrial rate was estimated to be \$24.04 per thousand," stated City Manager Fidel Maltez in a letter that was read at Monday night's city council meeting. "This variation is consistent with previous years and is due to the Department of Revenue applying their auto calculation methodology."

The residential rate shows a considerable reduction from the FY24

## Dispatchers raise concerns about regionalization plan

The city council will be holding a subcommittee meeting in the near future to discuss a possible regionalization of the city's dispatch operation with Revere and Winthrop.

However, the possibility of the move is raising concerns among the city's current E-911 dispatchers.

At Monday night's meeting, the council accepted a letter from City Manager Fidel Maltez outlining the possibility for the regionalization of services.

Revere and Winthrop are currently in the Metro North Regional Emergency Communication Center

## CTU, school committee agree to new contract

On Wednesday evening, Dec. 11, the Chelsea School Committee and the Chelsea Teachers' Union (CTU) reached tentative agreements on new contracts for Chelsea Public Schools educators, clerical and paraprofessional staff.

These agreements were reached as a result of collaborative negotiations between the School Committee and CTU.

The School Commit-

tee was expected to vote on official approval of the contract at a meeting scheduled for Wednesday

evening.

At a negotiation session last week with over 200 members in attendance, CTU Local 1340 secured new, three-year collective bargaining agreements for their members that take important steps to address essential classroom issues while ensuring these ded-

rate, which was \$11.90, according to Maltez.

According to calculations from the city's assessing department, the average FY25 tax bill will decrease for all owner-occupied, median assessed value properties from single families to three fam-

The decrease for a median owner-occupied single family home is calculated at \$67 per year, condos will decrease \$2.92, two family homes will decrease \$77.43, and three family homes will decrease by \$321.72 per year.

"The reduction in tax bills ... are thanks to the incredible work of the City Council to minimize the impact on residential properties, and the two votes taken earlier this year," Maltez stated. "The first vote is the setting of the Residential Exemption at the 35% exemption, the maximum amount allowed by statute. This provides the fullest possible tax relief benefit to owner-occupants, a reduction of \$3,044 in FY25 per owner-occupied proper-

The second vote shifted the maximum amount allowed by law to commercial and industrial proper-

"While we celebrate these results, we know that this reduction in tax bills will be an anomaly in future years," Maltez stated. "Our Administration will continue budgeting conservatively to protect our owner occupied properties, while continuing to provide amazing municipal services. I am confident that we will work with the City Council to ensure our positive trends continue."

icated educators are on track to receive a living wage and equitable workplace benefits, according to the CTU leadership.

"The consequences of this agreement will be transformative, providing greater stability and support for our educators and our students. This is a win for the entire Chelsea community, and we couldn't have done it without the sustained organizing and solidarity of educators, families, and community members," said CTU President Kathryn Anderson.

The agreement includes competitive wage increases for all educators, including the largest wage increase for paraprofessionals that the district has ever seen. Paraprofessionals currently receiving \$17.96 an hour will see a 62 percent pay increase over the course of the three-year contract, up to \$29.05 per hour. Clerks will see a 31 percent increase over the life of the contract - going from \$27.99 to \$36.61 per hour.

It also includes the first district-paid parental leave benefit (three weeks the first year of the contract and then six weeks in subsequent years), as well as up to 12 weeks paid leave for members to care for ill family members and up to

35 days from the sick bank. "Our priorities were living and competitive wages, humane leave policies, and equitable working and learning conditions," stated Anderson. "Not only did we achieve these priorities, we became so much stron-

ger as a Union." School district officials stated that these agreements reflect a shared vision for the future of Chelsea Public Schools and demonstrate a collective commitment to providing an exceptional education for all students.

"By prioritizing wages that are competitive with surrounding districts and emphasizing the importance of paid parental and family medical leave benefits puts CPS in a position to better attract great educators and make it easier for them to have long careers in the district," said

Superintendent Schools Dr. Almi G. Abey-

Highlights of the contract agreements related to wages include educators receiving a 13 percent wage increase over the duration of the contract and paraprofessionals receiving a 13 percent wage increase over the duration of the contract. Additionally, paraprofessionals will receive a number of differential adjustments.

Highlights of the contract agreements related to leave policies include:

Parental Leave policies have been updated to align with the Massachusetts Pa-

Leave Act (MPLA) and FMLA. Employees have three options when using parental leave.

Beginning July 1, 2025, all units will receive six weeks of fully paid parental leave (three weeks prior to July 1, 2025) that is not deducted from sick time.

Updates to the use of Sick Leave include using sick leave including up to 15 days per year to care for a sick or injured immediate family member (spouse, partner, child, parent).

Up to 45 additional days (with FMLA approval) for serious health conditions of a child, spouse/partner,

Additional highlights of the agreements include:

A new \$1,000 annual stipend for certified bilingual/ biliterate employees.

Increase in longevity bonuses for all units.

A CPS alumni hiring incentive for all units.

Educator hourly rates of pay will increase from \$35/ hour (2024) to \$37/hour (2025) to \$38/hour (2026).

A pilot program for class size limits effective from 2025-2027.

Clerical unit employees will be eligible for tuition reimbursement of one-half payment for up to three courses per year. Reimbursement is capped at \$10,000 annually for the

Provisions that will support professional development opportunities, enhance working conditions, and foster a positive and

"We're not just educators, we're also community members – nearly 20 percent of our members call Chelsea home and this agreement reflects that," said CTU Vice President and CPS Graduate Vanesa Mendoza-Mercado.

"It makes it possible for members to start families and take enough time to bond with their babies. It will mean being able to care for sick family members. It incentivizes former CPS students like me to become teachers. When educators are able to bring our full selves to the classroom, students benefit."

Marilyn Moschella, Paraprofessional Vice President and CPS Graduate, said that for the first time, Chelsea's paraprofessionals will receive a living wage - because teachers and clerks stood firmly with the paras as a united front.


"Paras are unsung heroes of the classroom, providing a foundation for students of all abilities to learn," Moschella said. "The new competitive wages in this agreement will make a huge difference for all members, and will attract great educators to the district. The level of solidarity – from our teachers, clerks, and families – is what helped get this monumental agreement over the

finish line." Brianna Bolland-Peterson, a CPS graduate with children at Kelly Elementary and Wright Science and Technology Academy said that as a parent, she sees the work educators put in each and every day to support the kids in Chelsea, including her.

"I was proud to support the Chelsea Teachers Union every step of the way to secure better learning conditions for all, and the wages and benefits our educators deserve," Bolland-Peterson said. "At the end of the day, they were fighting for our families just as much as they were fighting for theirs."

#### CHRISTMAS IS FAST APPROACHING, BUT THERE'S STILL TIME TO **HELP THOSE IN NEED**

It's hard to believe that Christmas is just a week away. We realize that the compressed holiday shopping season has put even more pressure than usual on all of us, but we hope that all of our readers can find the time to remember those in need this holiday season.

The stock market may be booming and unemploy-

ment may be near an all-time low, but there was the depressing news this past week that homelessness among Americans once again has increased in the past year and millions of American children (1 in 8) face food insecurity on a regular basis. The cold, harsh reality for many Americans in 2024 is

that the promise of benefitting from a booming economy still is only a dream, where even those who are lucky enough to work full-time are barely getting by thanks to the crushingly-high cost of housing. And for those who cannot find a job, or who are un-

iday preparations. But we urge all of our readers who have the means to do so to take a brief "time-out" in order to consider doing something to make the holiday season a bit brighter for those who are less fortunate. We can assure our readers that any gift of charity that we make, whether it be to a Toys for Tots program or

to a Salvation Army Santa (the Salvation Army provided services to 27 million Americans last year) or a food bank donation, will be the most meaningful — and most satisfying — act that we can make this holiday season.

#### THE BATTLE OF THE BULGE STARTED 80 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

It was 80 years ago this week that the final big battle of WWII in Western Europe -- the Battle of the Bulge -- got underway.

In brief, the Battle of the Bulge marked a last-ditch counter-offensive by the German Army against the U.S. and its allies as the allies advanced through Belgium and toward Germany. The German attack, which caught the Americans by surprise, earned its name from the "bulge" that the sudden German thrust created in the middle of the American line in the Ardennes Forest of Belgium.

The battle was immortalized in the 1965 movie, The Battle of the Bulge, and then 40 years later in the great HBO series Band of Brothers, which followed the exploits of E Company of the fabled 101st Airborne Division, including its crucial role in the defense of the Belgian town of Bastogne where General Anthony McAuliffe uttered the famous, one-word declaration word, "Nuts!" in response to a demand for him to surrender from the German commander who had surrounded the Americans. The 101st Airborne hung on, against all odds and a militarily-superior enemy, stalling the German offensive until General George Patton arrived with reinforcements.

Soldiers fought in brutal winter conditions against a ruthless German enemy that literally was taking no prisoners -- the Nazis executed hundreds of captured American soldiers during the engagement. Altogether, the U.S. Army lost approximately 19,000 men and suffered 75,000 total casualties in what became the United States' deadliest single World War II battle, which extended from December 16, 1944, to January 16, 1945. When the battle was over, so too for all intents and purposes were the Germans, whose surrender occurred less than four months later.


The reason we wish to make note of this epic battle is because in some of our sister newspapers, we write a weekly "Through the Years" column. In our Revere newspaper, it was noted that seven Revere families were notified this week 80 years ago that their sons, husbands, and fathers had been killed in action.

We today can only imagine the profound and deep sense of grief and sadness that enveloped entire communities all across the country as the telegrams from the War Department were delivered by the thousands to families informing them of the loss of their loved ones over those terrible four weeks.

In addition, it occurred to us that so few of the Greatest Generation, including our own uncles and fathers who served in that war, are still alive today. All of the members of Easy Company have passed away.

We do so in hopes of acknowledging the debt we owe to the brave soldiers who gave their lives in the forests and on the fields of Belgium 80 years ago, with the hope that we might fulfill the sentiments expressed by Abraham Lincoln in the Gettysburg Address: "...that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain."







#### CITY OF CHELSEA ANNOUNCES HOLIDAY-RELATED BUILDING CLOSURES

To provide its employees with ample time to relax, travel, and celebrate the holidays, the City of Chelsea has announced its public buildings will be closed from Tuesday. Dec. 24, at 2 p.m. through Thursday, Dec. 26, at 8 a.m. and Tuesday, Dec. 31, at 2 p.m. through

Thursday, Jan. 2, at 8 a.m. The City will also suspend all parking enforcement on Tuesday, Dec. 24 at 2 p.m. resuming on Friday, Dec. 27 at 8 a.m. In addition, enforcement will be paused on Tuesday. Dec. 31 at 2 p.m. and will resume on Friday, Jan. 3 at 8 a.m.

Curbside trash and recycling collection will not take place on Wednesday, Dec. 25, or Wednesday, Jan. 1.

The City also suspended parking meter enforcement in the downtown area from Dec. 9 through the end of 2024 to support local businesses during the holiday season and provide relief for the community following downtown construction. This initiative aims to encourage residents and visitors to shop locally, giving a boost to downtown businesses during the busy holiday shopping season.

While parking meters will not be enforced downtown, the City will continue to enforce the two-hour maximum parking rule in this area to promote turnover and ensure ample parking for all who wish to visit downtown.

#### **LICENSE** COMMISSION **APPROVES EXTENDED NEW** YEAR'S EVE HOURS

The city's license commission approved extended hours for restaurants and bars on New Year's Eve at its regular meeting last week.

As has been the case in past years, licensed liquor-serving establishments will be allowed to stay open until 2 a.m. on New Year's Eve.

According to Chelsea police, there have not been any issues in the past several years with the establishments remaining open for an additional hour on New Year's Eve.

## Chelsea BOH votes to adopt nicotine-free generation regulations

The Chelsea Board of Health voted unanimously at its Dec. 10th meeting to adopt the nicotine-free generation regulations, joining the small number of municipalities in Massachusetts that prohibit the sale of nicotine products to anyone born on or after January 1, 2004. The regulations will go into effect Jan. 1, 2025.

In addition, the board of health voted to limit the sale of Oral Nicotine pouches to adult only retail stores only, effective January 1, 2025. Retail establishments that are not licensed as Adult Only Retail stores will have a period of 3 months (until March 31, 2025) to selldown or remove nicotine pouches from their store.

The board of health vote last week came after a public hearing in November.

Board members said they took into account input from residents and businesses, both positive and negative, before taking the vote on the new regulations.

Some of those opposed

to the regulations stated they would hurt small, lo-

cal businesses. "History has shown us that prohibition doesn't work," stated Chris Duffy previously. Duffy is the CEO of James J Duffy Inc., a wholesale distributor of convenience goods.

"Attempts to curb nic-

otine and tobacco use through outright bans tend to shift sales to illicit markets rather than reduce overall usage," he stated. "Despite Massachusetts' 2019 ban on flavored tobacco products, youth are still accessing these products through online sources and illegal channels, bypassing responsible, law-abiding retailers in Chelsea. A ban has not prevented access for those determined to obtain these products; it has simply redirected sales. Prohibiting licensed retailers in Chelsea from selling adult-use products to adults, whether they're 21 or 81, won't resolve the issue."

In addition, Duffy stated that the policy penalizes Chelsea's retailers—most of whom he said follow strict ID checks for adult products—and slowly devalues their businesses by pushing customers to surrounding towns.

Board of health member Dr. Dean Xerras said boards of health are appointed or elected bodies that are responsible for looking out for the health and wellbeing of the communities they serve. He said the boards can enact more restrictive health regulations as long as they do not violate state law.

Over his nearly 20 years on the board, Xerras said it has enacted regulations regarding leather processing by businesses in the city, has banned artificial trans-fats, and raised the minimum age for the sale of tobacco products from 18 to 21. "I think we did our due

In September 2023, the board of health banned tobacco products that were labeled as non-menthol but marketed to people who purchase menthol flavors. This decision helped lead to a statewide ban of these products by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health in 2024.

This local action coincides with broader statewide efforts to address nicotine use. A recent announcement revealed that nicotine-free generation legislation is set to be introduced in the Massachusetts legislature in January 2025, signaling growing momentum for this public health initiative, according to city officials.
