Year In Review Balancing prosperity and priorities

The year 2018 saw many changes in Chelsea as the city tried to balance prosperity with priorities all year long. While new investment poured in, residents struggled to stay in the city and schools grappled with budget cuts. Meanwhile, public transit increased substantially in a positive direction with the introduction of the new Silver Line service.

- Flooding becomes a major issue after a Jan. 4 blizzard and a March 2 storm, both of which occur during substantial high tides. The Jan. 4 blizzard caused a huge storm surge that flooded many parts of the city and even shut down operations at the Chelsea Street Bridge.
- The New England Flower Exchange celebrates its first Valentine's Day holiday at its new location on Second Street after being in Boston's South End for the past 50 years. The new facility has been brought online seamlessly.
- Wynn CEO Steve Wynn seemed to be in control of his company and the project in Everett until late January, when he was accused of sexual misconduct in a Wall Street Journal report. The allegations quickly gathered steam, and by February Wynn had resigned from the company and the li-


cense for the Everett casino was in jeopardy and the project to be moving forward "at risk." The new CEO became Matt Maddox and the company saw huge amounts of turnover throughout the year. By the end of 2018, the license for the Everett site was still in limbo and an investigation into the matter still had yet to be revealed – having been delayed for months.

- City Manager Tom Ambrosino says in his State of the City on Feb. 26 that now is not the time to save up money, but rather the time to continue investing in the City and its residents. He announces several key programs for the upcoming year.
- Sen. Sal DiDomenico is involved in a heated and intense bid for the office of Senate President over several months, but in the summer comes up just short in getting the votes necessary to prevail. Sen. President Karen Spilka gets the nod instead, but DiDomenico remains the assistant majority leader and ends up coming out of the battle in a very good position of leadership.
- Students at Chelsea High stage a walk-out in regard to school safety and school shootings on March 15. Despite lots of snow, thousands of students take to the Stadium for the one-hour protest.



Imane Rharbi said there can be no more school shootings. She said now is the time for stricter gun control during the March 15 student walk-out.

•YIHE company returns to the City with a new plan for the old Forbes site in the Mill Hill neighborhood. They start the process in April with a scaled down version of their previous plan, but reviews of the project continue throughout the year and into 2019.



• The Chelsea Soldiers' Home secured a \$70 million budget item from the federal government in April that allowed the replacement of the Quigley Hospital to move forward. The Community Living Center has a groundbreaking in the fall and construction is ongoing in the new year.

• The Chelsea Walk is transformed throughout the spring, summer and fall in a unique placemaking partnership between the City and Green-Roots. At the end, there is a new mural on the Walk and more activity. New things are also planned for the Walk in 2019.

• A \$3.1 million School Budget gap hits the School Department hard, with numerous cuts reported to key school services. Th School Department, City and state grapple with the issue all summer long, but no resolution to the issue emerges at the end of the legislative session. The school funding fix is still outstanding, and no fix has yet been passed to help districts like Chelsea, who have been penalized mistakenly by a new formula.

• Chelsea High sophomore track star Stephanie Simon caps off a stellar year by heading to the National Track Meet in North Carolina over the summer. She placed 15th in the high jump and 27th in the triple jump out of a field of athletes from around the nation.

• Students at the Clark Avenue Middle School are ecstatic to return to school on Aug. 29, and that's because they were able to enter their brand new building for the first time. The Clark Avenue premiered to excited parents and students for the new school term after many years of construction.

• The Sept. 4 Primary Election features many surprises, but the biggest headline of the night, however, was when Boston City Councilor Ayanna Pressley upset sitting Congressman Michael Capuano decidedly. Capuano had campaigned hugely in Chelsea, and won here with 54 percent of the vote. However, a strong Boston turnout propelled Pressley to an big win. Pressley also had notable support in Chelsea from Council President Damali Vidot and School Committeeman Julio Hernandez.

- The Two-Way Broadway proposal gathers steam, but fizzles out as residents and elected officials protest the change vehemently. That came after a late-August approval of the plan by the Traffic Commission. However, in September, it fails to get past the City Council. Broadway will remain a one-way street.
- Supt. Mary Bourque surprises most in late December when she announces she will retire at the end of 2019, pledging to help the School Committee with a new superintendent search throughout the year.

Fences, construction begins on Soldiers' Home this week

The Chelsea Soldiers' Home construction project will begin in earnest this week as fences are expected to go up around most of Malone Park.

Supt. Cheryl Poppe told the Record that the construction fence is scheduled to go up any day on about two-thirds of Malone Park, with about one-third of the park on the western edge to remain open.

"About two-thirds of the park will be fenced off and one-third will stay open," she said. "That will help us start

the drainage work, the geothermal wells and the parking lot. I want to make sure everyone knows what is happening with the project and that they can use the park one last time before it is closed off."

The project will be the replacement of the old Quigley Memorial Hospital with a new Community Living Center for veterans. The \$199 million project is a partnership between the federal and state government and represents one of the largest expenditures for long-term veterans care in the history of the state.

State Rep. Dan Ryan inaugurated Wednesday for new term

Chelsea's State Rep. Dan Ryan has been inaugurated for another term in the legislature this week, and he said he is ready to tackle issues from transportation to opiate recovery research in the new term.

On Wednesday, with the new class of the state legislature, Rep. Ryan took the oath of office along with Gov. Charlie Baker and the rest of the Commonwealth. It will be his third full term in office, and he said it will be an interesting term with new faces and a Republican governor in his second round.

"I think the voters of Chelsea and Charlestown first and foremost for giving me two more years," he said. "It will be my third full term and Gov. Baker's second term. We'll House and it will be very interesting to see what those changes look like. It will be interesting to see what happens with Gov. Baker's second term. He was easy to work with in the first term with very moderate Republican stances. Second terms are different so we'll see what that dynamic looks like."

Ryan also praised House Speaker Bob DeLeo for his leadership in 2018, and his new term in 2019 – having also been sworn in as the House Speaker again on Wednesday. "I'll be supporting the Speaker in this next term," he said. "He's had a strong hand in this legislative session with everything going on in the Senate, the House needed to be the grown up in the room and the Speaker was very pragmatic in moving things forward."

Ryan is now the vice chair of the Substance Abuse/Mental Health Committee, and also serves on the Transportation, Post Audit and Veterans Affairs Committees. He said he has also been appointed to Task Forces charged with looking at the Commuter Rail and looking into issues related to the Opiate Bill passed last year.

Chelsea man arrested after leaving two in serious condition

Police have arrested a 24-year-old Chelsea man in connection to a shooting and stabbing at 16 Pleasant St. early Saturday morning.

Hector Emilio Hernandez, was arrested on charges of attempted murder and unlawful possession of a firearm following the alleged attack, according to Jake Wark, spokesman for the Suffolk County District Attorney's office.

Revere police and emergency medical personnel responded to 16 Pleasant St. at about 1:45 a.m. Saturday to find a 27-year-old man from Chelsea apparently shot and a 23-year old man from Chelsea apparently stabbed. Both were hospitalized. State Police detectives were notified and the Suffolk County State Police Detective Unit responded.

Hernandez is expected to be arraigned Monday in Chelsea District Court.

"The relationship between the parties involved remains under investigation, as do the circumstances surrounding the violent encounter," Wark said in a statement.

Wark added that based on an investigation that continued through Saturday morning and into Saturday afternoon, troopers and officers developed information that the suspect may be in the area of Calumet Street in Revere. Troopers and officers set up surveillance and observed a man matching the suspect's description enter a residence on that street.

When police went to the house they observed the suspect exit a back door and try to climb a fence. He was caught and apprehended and transported to the State Police Barracks in Revere where he was booked on charges of attempted murder and unlawful possession of a firearm.

SO FAR....SO GOOD

With the rush and hub-bub of the holiday season now over, we'll all be settling in for another long New England winter.

Up to this point, we have been fortunate. We have yet to feel the wrath of any truly wintry weather. A cold day here or there -- including a chilly Thanksgiving -- has not been hard to take. Indeed, the temperatures have been quite moderate since the Winter Solstice on Dec. 21, with the New Year's Day temperature rising into the mid-50s, making it quite a nice day for a walk or a run outside, despite the strong breeze.

However, we know that Mother Nature typically saves her best (or worst) for later in the season. In just the past few years, we had winter storm Nemo in February of 2013, the Snowmageddon winter of 2015 (in which there was no snow in December), and last year we had those crazy storms in early January and early March that knocked out power throughout the region and brought coastal flooding to places along our bayside areas that never had experienced it to that extent before.

The images of Boston Harbor flooding into the Seaport District and water pouring into the Aquarium T stop were something we never had seen in our entire lives as residents of this area -- and that includes the Blizzard of '78 and the No Name Storm of 1991. The highest-ever high tide (exceeding the Blizzard of '78) and the third-highest tide in Boston Harbor were recorded in those two storms last year.

As we are writing this, the 10-day forecast is pretty nice, especially considering that it is the first part of January. However, the models for the long-range forecast indicate that February will be colder, snowier, and stormier than usual in our part of the country.

But as any longtime New Englander knows, all that we can do is to take winter one day at a time and be grateful for the nice days when we get them. When it comes to the weather, especially in this era of climate change, we are at the mercy of the vicissitudes of Mother Nature.

We can hope for the best, but we must expect the worst.



Cold Weather Safety Tips When you are outside

Frostbite and hypothermia are possible so you need to protect yourself.

1. Wear layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm cloth-

2. Wear a hat. Try to stay dry and out of the wind.

3. Cover your mouth to protect your lungs from extreme cold.

4. Mittens, snug at the wrist, are better than gloves.

Ice Safety.

1. There has only been a short period of ice making weather. Ice has not had a chance to thicken and firm up.

2. It is recommended you stay off the ice at this time.

To keep pipes from freez-

ing on an outside wall:

1. Let hot and cold water trickle or drip at night from a

faucet.

2. Open cabinet doors to allow more heat to get to un-insulated pipes under a sink or near an outer wall.

3. Make sure heat is left on and set no lower than 55 degrees.

4. If you plan to be away: (1) Have someone check your house daily to make sure the heat is still on to prevent freezing, or (2) drain and shut off the water system (except indoor sprinkler systems).

Idoor sprinkler system
If Pipes Freeze:

1. Make sure you and your family knows how to shut off the water, in case pipes burst.

2. NEVER try to thaw a pipe with an open flame or

torch. Use a hair dryer instead.

3. Always be careful of the

potential for electric shock in and around standing water. Carbon monoxide poisoning is a gilent deadly killer

ing is a silent, deadly killer claiming about 1,000 lives each year in the United States.

1. Install a carbon monoxide detector.

2.NEVER run generators indoors.

3. Open a window slightly when using a kerosene heater and follow the manufacturer's instructions.

4. NEVER use a gas oven to heat your home.

5. If your heat goes out, you can keep warm indoors by closing off rooms you do not need, dressing in layers of lightweight clothing, and wearing a cap.

Wood-burning stoves, fireplaces and heaters:

1. Always keep a screen around an open flame.

2. NEVER use gasoline to

start your fireplace.

3. NEVER burn charcoal indoors.

4. Do not close the damper

when ashes are hot.

5. Use only safe sources of alternative heat such as a fire-place, small well-vented wood or coal stove or portable space heaters. Always follow manufacturer's instructions.

Getting Out

Not Your Grandmother's 'Cinderella'

So who knew.....

That Prince Charming (a.k.a. Topher) isn't really charming, but a dragonslayer with a paucity of social skills, self-confidence, and awareness of the kingdom's usurping farmers' lands, inciting his subjects' increasing growling against the empty throne?

Is lovely Ella (Kaitlyn Mayse), who sits "in her own little corner," among the cinders, doing household chores and obeying her cruel stepmother's orders, also an activist, touting kindness, forgiveness and rights for the downtrodden?

You couldn't guess, either, that Topher's parents were dead. In their absence, Prime Minister Sebastian (Christopher Swan) has schemed against the throne and its subjects, while keeping young Topher (Lukas James Miller) unaware, attending school in remote places.

Topher laments his struggle with self-identity in song,

"Me, Who Am I?" "I wish I were doing something important with my life," he says.

Okay. You probably wouldn't realize that Ella's stepmother, twice-widowed Madame (Sarah Smith), overtly admits she married Cinderella's father strictly for his money, not love, and wants to marry off her daughters to rich, important men.

And Madame's two daughters? They're not the demanding, cruel young ladies you remember in Disney's animated film. Gabrielle (Natalie Girard) is a gentle, kinder stepsister, who secretly yearns for newly-created character, awkward, social activist Jean-Michel (Nic Casaula). She doesn't give a hoot about Prince Topher, who must assume the throne as its righ-

Meanwhile, chunky, stepsister Charlotte (Joanna Johnson) isn't cruel, either. She's a comedic scene-stealer with a fatalistic attitude, creating laughter throughout the show.

Actually, Cinderella isn't

treated as miserably as we anticipated. Her stepmother is demanding and ambitious to get her daughters married off to the prince and other wealthy men.

Charlotte? She's And whiny, like a petulant child, clueless, and guileless, a hoot in solo, "Stepsisters Lament," accompanied by the female ensemble.

All this and more fractured facts are revealed in Douglas Carter Beane's updated, socially acceptable revision and touring company production of Rodgers and Hammerstein's beloved fairytale-musical, "Cinderella," that appeared through Dec. 30 at Emerson Colonial Theatre, Boston. The musical is presented by Ambassador Theatre Group and produced by Work Light Productions.

Hm. So Cinderella doesn't lose her slipper on the castle stairs when she runs from the castle at the stroke of midnight. Later, she throws it to Topher, so he can find her.

The two met earlier in the

show, when Topher and his entourage arrived at her domicile, requesting water to drink. They met again unexpectedly in the forest, when she encouraged him to become more self-confident and keenly aware of his subjects' mistreatment.

The love-at-first-sight couple also realize they're both orphans, too, who've been misguided by her stepmother and longtime prime minister-guardian, Sebastian. Discovering more about each other, they wonder in duet, "Do I Love You Because You're Beautiful," etc., and share the same goal- to make the world a better place.

The charming musical is based on the 1950's Disney animated film that stole children's and adults' hearts with its lexicon of beautiful award-winning songs and fabled fantasy. That version was converted to a stage musical in 1957, starring Julie Andrews. Since then, "Cinderella" has been revised and reworked into television specials and Beane's ultimate 2013 Broadway revision, winning a Tony Award.

Besides being an ardent activist for the downtrodden, Cinderella advocates kindness, especially to shunned, bent beggar woman Marie, Cinderella's secret fairy godmother, who magically creates instant solutions to impossible circumstances. Zina Ellis' instantaneous transformation from elderly, shunned, tattered, Marie to marvelously magnificent fairy godmother, garbed in frothy orchid-hued gown and sparkling crown, awed little fans, sparkling in princess gowns, tiaras and glittery shoes. With her magic wand, amid clouds of stage fog, Marie changes little creatures to footmen and a sparkly pumpkin to a magnificent

Ellis' clear, melodic soprano soars in songs "Impossible," "There's Music in You;" her contrasting song, "It's Possible;" a reprise of Ella's"In My Own Little Corner; and the company's upbeat finale.

Not surprising but awesome are multi-Tony Award winning costume designer William Ivey Long's frocks enabling Cinderella, Marie, and others to transform, split-second, from peasant garb to glittering, regal splendor, with a flip of the hand, unfurling the costume underneath.

Anna Louizos' set, coupled with Kenneth Posner's lighting and Nevin Steinberg's sound effects, rapidly transforms from twilight-lit forests to castledom's pomp and heraldry, and Cinderella's home.

Lee Wilkins' choreography is ho-hum for the most part, but lively in ensemble ballroom and village festival scenes.

Last Sunday matinee's multi-generational audience enjoyed the show, but were equally awed by the magnificent, ornately painted, refurbished Colonial Theatre itself. It's worth the price of admission to see this showcase and historic remembrance of theater palaces' heyday.






