Ambrosino asks to renegotiate casino agreement to shift money to workforce development

Money the city is set to receive from Encore Boston Harbor could be going toward job training for Chelsea resi-

Monday night, the City Council voted 8-3 to allow City Manager Thomas Ambrosino to renegotiate the city's Surrounding Community Agreement (SCA) with Encore to set aside \$100,000 of the \$225,000 earmarked for roadway repairs in the agreement for workforce development.

"I still believe that workforce development is an important and unmet need in the City," Ambrosino stated in a letter to the council. "This casino mitigation agreement provides an opportunity to set aside a modest annual amount for that purpose. The source would be a portion of the funds set aside in the existing Agreement for roadway improvements, a program which the City already adequately supports through other available revenues.'

Although the council approved Ambrosino's renegotiation with Encore, several councillors opposed moving funds away from road improvements to workforce development.

"Why take the money from where it was intended to go and put it somewhere else?" District 6 Councillor Giovanni Recupero asked.

Councillor-At-Large Avellaneda countered

Chelsea parents, Collaborative a lead in new lawsuit on school funding

Several parents of Chelsea Public School students and the Chelsea Collaborative have taken a lead role in a statewide school funding lawsuit filed against the state Department of Education on Thursday for ignoring the constitutional mandate requiring the Commonwealth to fund a quality education for all students.

The parents allege constitutional violations of students' education and civil rights as a result of the state's inadequate school funding system.

"Students in underfunded school districts are being deprived of the opportunity to

receive the education to which they are entitled," alleges the lawsuit filed with the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court. "Public schools are increasingly unable to provide sufficient resources to meet ever-increasing educational challenges."

Collaborative Executive Director Gladys Vega said her organization and several parents tried to work within the system, but it came time to take action because the system wasn't responding.

"For us, we've been ing in the system; we've tried everything," she said. "The failure of the system means our children are being neglected and their future is compromised because our legislators do not have the moral courage to do what benefits these children. We feel we have done everything right, right, right, but the state leaders don't do their part. In Chelsea, we have to take municipal dollars that may be going to hire two or three police officers and using that for the schools instead. We need the state to step up and provide these funds. Chelsea's Vanesa Perea will attend Harvard University

Vanesa Perea, who enrolled at Excel Academy East Boston in the fifth grade and graduated from Excel Academy High School in June, will begin her studies at Harvard University as a member of the incoming Class of 2023.

Admission to the world's most prestigious college culminated an eight-year journey of educational enrichment and academic achievement for high honor roll student Vanesa Perea at the Excel charter schools, whose mission is to prepare students to succeed in high school and college, apply their learning to solve relevant problems, and engage productively in their communities.

"I like STEM," said Vanessa, explaining the concentration of courses in science and mathematics. Vanesa also took her talents

to the athletic fields where she competed in varsity soccer and served as team captain for two seasons. She was also

a member of the Excel track team.

One of her most recognized accomplishments was founding the school newspaper, "The Howler," and serving as editor of the publication. The school presented a graduation award named in honor of Vanesa and her classmate, Evelyn Rodriguez, the other co-founder of the newspaper. That award went to the newspaper's founding duo.

She was the backstage director for the Music Club and served on the Student Council for two years.

Encore Boston Harbor to open at 10 a.m. June 23, short program before



Don't expect a long program ahead of the Encore Boston Harbor ribbon cutting on Sunday morning, June 23, but expect the City and the company to get things moving and get the doors open.

Encore will open officially to the public at 10 a.m. Sunday, June 23, and that will be preceded by a short program at 9:30 a.m. to celebrate the moment. However, after seven years of speeches and discussion about Encore, the time will be punctuated with the goal of getting inside the building.

Elected officials from the City and state are expected to be there, along with company executives from all over the world. A large contingent of media is also expected to be present for the opening morning as well.

There are to be a few small surprises, but the goal, once again, is to get people in the door.

A full plan for transportation will be put in place early that day, with officers from the State Police, Everett Police, Boston Police, Medford Police and Chelsea Police on forced overtime to monitor the streets into and out of the Encore casino area.

Councillors say it's time to put the brakes on water, sewer increases

Several City Councillors are lining up in opposition to water and sewer rate hikes proposed by the Department of Public Works, urging residents to attend a public hear-

In a letter to the Council, City Manager Thomas Amrate increases of just under 3 percent for water and sewer customers who use less than 2,500 cubic feet of water. Under the City's tiered approach to water and sewer rates, customers who use over that amount will see a 5 percent increase.

"With this increase, the average water and sewer bill in Chelsea (assuming annual usage of 120 hundred cubic feet) will be \$1,828.80," Ambrosino stated.

The rates will cover approved expenditures \$8,709,470 for water and \$13,326,503 for sewer for Fiscal Year 2020, according to the City Manager.

But with surpluses totaling about \$7 million in the water and sewer enterprise accounts, several councillors questioned the need for rate increases on Monday night.

"I don't know why we need any increase in the water and sewer rates," said District 1 Councillor Robert Bishop. "I don't understand why you have to go up at all with \$7 million sitting there, that should be sufficient."

Bishop said he would be attending the DPW public hearing on the rates, tentatively scheduled for July 16 to voice his displeasure, and said he hopes to see other councillors there as well.

Councillor District 6 Giovanni Recupero, never one to mince words, said homeowners and renters will end

Chelsea Soldiers' Home awarded \$100 million to replace long term care facility

The Chelsea Soldiers' Home has been awarded \$100 million from the United States Department of Veterans Affairs to replace its long term care facility. The grant will reimburse the Commonwealth of up to 65% of construction costs for the Chelsea Soldiers' Home. The Baker-Polito Administration has secured the funds to rebuild the facility.

"Today marks another milestone for the redevelopment of the Chelsea Soldiers' Home," said Governor Charlie Baker. "It is our duty to care for those who stood up and served this nation, and our obligation to ensure that their sacrifices are not forgotten. This funding allows us to move forward in that commitment."

"Receiving this grant demonstrates Massachusetts' strong relationship with veteran organizations on both the state and federal lev-

el," said Lt. Governor Karyn Polito. "This award helps the Chelsea Soldiers' Home continue its efforts in providing care to our veterans with honor, dignity and respect."

Governor Baker announced plans for the new long term care Community Living Center (CLC) in May of 2017 and a groundbreaking was celebrated in October of 2018. During the construction, the facility will remain fully operational. The new facility will have 154 private rooms to care for veterans. The project is anticipated to be completed in 2022.

"We appreciate the financial commitment and collaboration with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs," said Health and Human Services Secretary Marylou Sudders. "We are building a state of the art facility that will

Three Encore water shuttles expected to run regular route on opening day

There's never needed to be a dockmaster for any of Everett's waterfront for the past 100 years, but Encore's Jay Larcome is going to be a very valuable asset to the docks and waterways around Encore in the coming months.

Larcome is Encore's first Dockmaster, and is responsible primarily for managing the dock staff and making sure the four Encore water shuttles are on time and in working

"My primary job is to make sure the water shuttle is running on time and welcoming people on and off the water shuttle – getting them on the dock and pointed in the right direction," he said.

He said right now they believe they will have three of the four water shuttles operating on opening day, June 23. He said that while Bay State Captain License, he transport-Cruise Lines would captain and operate the water shuttles, he has a crew of four full-time staffers on the dock and one extra helper. There are also two seasonal workers during the summer boating season that will be on his staff as well.

"I think it's very exciting to see the water transportation side of Encore," he said. "It's something like I haven't ever seen in Boston. It will be exciting to see it come together. We've got great folks working the docks and we're really excited about the water transportation side of the development."

Larcome has a long history of working in security and the boating world.

He worked for 25 years as a police officer for Newburyport Police Department, retiring in 1998. For several years, already having his Master's ed yachts from Florida to the Bahamas to New England. After that, he began working for Chuck and Ann Lagasse at a 500-slip marina in Newburyport. Eventually he transferred to the Lagasse's Charlestown Marina operation just down the river from Encore.

For the last three years, he has been launching the Lagasse's new Provincetown marina operation.

At Encore, he said that the larger 250-foot mega yachts would not be able to come into Encore, and they would probably have their passengers transfer to smaller boats at the Inner Harbor. Those boats would then drop off people at the Encore docks.

He said they are approved for touch-and-go dock operations, so no one can come in and "park" their boat. They can stay for five or 10 minutes to pick up and drop off passengers. Likewise, there will be no anchoring in the Encore inlet or the Mystic River. That, he said, would be patrolled by Everett Police in their new Harbormaster boat.

His staff, however, will be on the docks 24/7 to welcome passengers to the touch-andgo in private boats.

He said he is very excited for the opening day, and the coming months after as the full water program digs in.

"It's a touch and go situation for the time being because this is a small piece of the bigger puzzle. As the days go on, the puzzle will fill out and we'll offer more amenities. We're going to keep it simple at the beginning and just get our feet wet and not try to go overboard," he concluded with a laugh.

for Encore, the MBTA and law enforcement agencies have been meeting for several months to coordinate the opening period plan. That plan is flexible, and executives said that if there needs to be a change in routing vehicles, they will be able to do that on the fly.

The casino will be stressing the use of its shuttle from Wellington and Malden Center Stations, as well as the Neighborhood Runner in Everett/Chelsea and the water shuttles in the Harbor. For those coming from long distances, the Encore buses are the preferred option, with depots north, south and west of Greater Boston.

Parking on site at Encore is \$22 for six hours, \$42 for 24 hours, and \$49 for 24-hour valet parking. As part of the special grand opening offer, Red Card holders can use one COMPDOLLAR to pay for onsite parking.

Inside the casino after opening, the State Police Gaming Enforcement Unit's Encore commanded deployment, by State Police Lt Timothy Babbin and made up of MSP Officers, will enforce the law inside and outside the casino to maintain a safe environment for the employees and patrons of the casino and to assist in preserving the integrity of the gaming operation. Unit members will be first responders to any emergency incident on casino property, and will conduct follow-up investigations for any potential criminal act on the property. State Police personnel are, of course, supplemented on the casino floor by private security employed by the casino, which is under the excellent direction of retired Massachusetts State Police Special Operations commander Richard Prior.

Troopers and Everett Police

The Troopers and Officers in the unit have undergone training in best practices related to casino security and policing, a spokesman said. In addition to our responsibilities at Encore, the Gaming Enforcement Unit, under the overall command of Detective Lt. Brian Connors, is supported by the full resources of the Massachusetts State Police as necessary.

Brisk function business already a surprise niche for Encore

The bookings for hotel rooms at Encore Boston Harbor is strong at the moment, but the company said this week they are quite surprised by the interest in group bookings for conventions.

The 671 hotel rooms at Encore have a rock bottom rate of \$645 per night, but the Tower also has suites that run at \$12,000 per night.

"Bookings are strong," said Michael Weaver, chief communications officer for Wynn Resorts

The average price for a room on opening night, June 23, is running at \$777 now, which is more than \$100 above the bottom rate for a room of that type. However, the demand is much lower in price as the days go on, but

picks up again on June 29. One surprising piece of

business right now for Encore is the group bookings, Weaver said.

"What we're really pleased about is group bookings," he said. "We had a lot of interest for meetings and conventions and have done a lot of tours with meeting planners and people looking to book conventions. They are very interested. We are very optimistic about that part of the business."

Weaver said he felt that would be great for the communities surrounding Encore.

"People going to a convention will often add a day to the beginning or end of their stay so they can get in a little vacation time," he said. "That will bring people into the commu-



there are numerous mechanisms in the budget for roadway improvements, but revenue streams for workforce development are nonexistent.

"This is a good use, in my view, of that \$100,000," he said, adding the training would benefit Chelsea residents.

But District 1 Councillor Robert Bishop said the workforce development money would be used mainly for casino and other hospitality trades.

"That is something the casino should be spending money on, not us," said Bishop. "Why should we pay to train people at the casino?" District 3 Councillor Joe

Perlatonda cast the third vote against the measure, agreeing with Bishop that the wording of the proposal focused too heavily on training for jobs in the casino industry.

Council approved the Community Preservation Act Budget for Fiscal Year 2020, and approved Community Preservation Act funds for six projects, including renovating the Civil War Monument, the Marlborough Street Community Garden, Bellingham-Cary House building repairs, the Garden Cemetery project, Congregation Agudath Sholom repairs, and money for an affordable housing trust fund specialist.

she spoke at a rally last Thursday as well.

"Chelsea is one of the poorest communities in Massachusetts and it sits within a stone's throw of Massachusetts' capital city," said Balderas, a parent from Chelsea whose son is a plaintiff in the case. "For years, the state has ignored the education needs of children here, including my 10-year-old. Our Constitution requires the state to educate all students, no matter where they live, their family income, the color of their skin, the language they speak at home or the services they need to succeed."

Balderas, who is blind, said it took an incident where the Department of Social Services (DSS) got mistakenly involved with her son to get the Chelsea Schools to do the evaluation she had wanted for years. She said those things are not done because there is not money to implement the costly plans that are often a remedy to help students with learning or behavioral challenges.


"I wanted help and nobody would help," she said. "It took DSS involvement for the schools to jump and do the evaluation...Everything is not fine. We need help. For others, it could be worse than it was for me, especially if they don't have the language skills. They just stay silent because they don't know. Imagine how many people are going through so much pain with their children and no one is listening because they don't have the language to speak up.

said she sees the problems that are creeping up due to lack of funding. It's something she also remembers as a student at Chelsea High.

"The situations we have here sends a message these kids don't matter," she said. "That message really gets to the kids – that they are not as important or not as valuable as the children from wealthier districts. It's an unfortunate situation. This is something I have worked all my life to address. I want to come back to be a social worker at Chelsea Public Schools for this reason. The teachers and administrators need more support...It's infuriating as a parent. The teachers are overwhelmed and the classrooms are too big. I worry about the teachers. I see they are exhausted and burning out. That all goes back to the state funding formulas."

The plaintiffs – children and their parents from Chelsea, Chicopee, Fall River, Haverhill, Lowell, Orange, and Springfield - are joined in the suit by the New England Area Conference of the NAACP and the Collaborative, whose members include parents and students in those seven underfunded school districts.

DiDomenico delivers for Chelsea in Senate Budget

Staff Report

Senator Sal DiDomenico and his colleagues in the Massachusetts Senate recently passed a \$42.8 billion budget for Fiscal Year 2020, after three days of deliberations. The budget recommends targeted investments to provide access to opportunity and economic vitality across the Commonwealth. As Assistant Majority Leader of the Massachusetts Senate, Senator Di-Domenico was able to secure a number of amendments providing additional funding for his local communities, bringing home resources for the

city of Chelsea. "After careful deliberation, the Senate has passed a thoughtful budget that both reflects the shared priorities of our chamber and addresses the pressing needs of our communities," said Senator DiDomenico, Assistant Majority Leader of the Massachusetts Senate. "This budget includes key investments in many of my top priority items that will have a positive and direct impact on Chelsea, and I am happy to report that many of my amendments providing additional resources for our community were also adopted to the final Senate

budget. I would like to thank Senate Ways & Means Chair Michael Rodrigues and Senate President Karen Spilka for all of their great work to craft a budget that will undoubtedly help to move our entire Com-

monwealth forward." Funds secured by Senator DiDomenico for the city of Chelsea include:

* \$75K for a youth worker in the Chelsea public schools

* \$25K for CONNECT, a financial opportunity center in the city of Chelsea

* \$3.8M increase in Chapter 70 education funding for the Chelsea public schools

Other budget amendments filed by Senator DiDomenico include:

* \$2M to establish a grant program for statewide census outreach to support trusted community organizations and grassroots leaders to help reach historically hard-tocount communities

* \$1M in new funding to create a pilot program that seeks to close the SNAP Gap in Massachusetts

* new language to ensure high-needs schools continue using a breakfast after the bell model to boost school breakfast participation rates

* \$300K to Nurtury to help expand their network of family child care providers

* \$250K for Operation ABLE, the only agency in Massachusetts committed solely to the employment needs of mature workers (those 45 years and older)

* \$200K for the 1199 SEIU Training and Upgrading Fund to help increase the quality of consumer, patient and resident care.

The Senate's budget also strengthens Massachusetts' commitment to being a national leader in ensuring children of all backgrounds have access to greater educational opportunities. Consistent with the Senate's long-standing commitment to supporting increased investments in education, this budget makes a significant down payment on the work of the Foundation Budget Review Commission (FBRC), and funds Chapter 70 at its highest level ever: \$5.176B, an increase of \$268.4M over FY 2019. The city of Chelsea will receive over \$81.5M in Chapter 70 education funding, a \$3.8M increase over the previous fiscal year.

"With this budget, we are making it clear that we are serious about securing more funding for our K-12 public schools and reforming our

ANOTHER SAD SIGN OF THE TIMES

The news that North American right whales -- considered to be the second-most endangered marine mammal in the world -- have been migrating further north into Canada in just the past two years because of a shift in their traditional feeding grounds that has been brought about by warming waters in the eastern part of the Gulf of Maine is yet another indication of the direct and indirect consequences of climate change and global warm-

The situation is this: Water temperatures in the eastern Gulf of Maine have warmed more than just about any body of water on the planet thanks to a shift in ocean current patterns that have been caused by the loss of sea ice in the Arctic.

As a result of the warmer water temperatures in the eastern Gulf, the population of the copepod Calanus finmarchicus, a tiny flealike creature that hibernates in deep water over the winter and comes to the surface in the summer, where it then becomes food for the right whales (who scoop them up by the millions with their sieve-like baleen), has declined by 90 percent.

This has forced the right whales to move further north into the St. Lawrence Seaway in pursuit of the copepods.

However, unlike in the Gulf of Maine, where regulations have been in effect for decades to protect the right whales from shipstrikes and the effects of lobster and fishing gear, no similar regulations existed in the St. Lawrence Seaway until just this past year -- but only after more right whales were killed in 2017 than in any previous year by ships and netting.

The Canadian government finally imposed regulations designed to protect the whales and now is monitoring the right whales by air in order to provide virtually around-the-clock surveillance of these wonderful creatures. As a result, there were few reported deaths in 2018.

However, taking such steps is doing nothing more than applying the proverbial band-aid to just one of the many adverse effects caused by the overall problem of climate change.

The change in the right whales' migration patterns is just another nail in the coffin of these animals, whose total population numbers around just 400. It is thought that unless something miraculous occurs, the North American right whale will become extinct within 20 years -- and even that might be optimistic given the

rapid increase in climate change that is accelerating at a rate far faster than even the most-dire warnings had predicted.

The No. American right whales are the proverbial canary in the coal mine for every living creature on the planet. Their migration in the pursuit of food mirrors what is happening across the earth, not only in the animal world, but for humans as well. This is why the U.S. military views climate change not only as a direct threat to our naval bases because of rising ocean levels, but also as the gravest threat to world peace in the coming decades because of instability in regions of the world from where hundreds of millions of people will be forced to migrate in order

Scientists tells us that the window of opportunity to stop global warming and climate change is closing with every passing day because of the refusal of governments to take the steps necessary to save the planet as we know it.

It already may be too late to save the North American right whale from extinction. We can only hope that we still have a chance to save us from ourselves.

Know the warning signs of Alzheimer's Disease

Alzheimer's disease is a progressive, degenerative disease of the brain resulting in memory loss, impaired thinking, and personality changes. Brain damages influence the way people act and react. As comprehension falters, emotional and behavioral problems may soar. Not everyone with the disease exhibits behavioral problems, but these problems are a common indication of the disease.

The Alzheimer's Association lists ten warning signs of the disease:

- 1. Recent memory loss affecting job skills
- 2. Difficulty accomplishing familiar tasks
- 3. Struggling with finding the right word
- 4. Disorientation to place
- and time
- 5. Poor judgment

7. Misplacing items 8. Altered mood or behavior 9. Changes in personality

10. Loss of initiative

Don't jump to the conclusion unusual behavior indicates a person has Alzheimer's disease. If several family members have been afflicted with the disease perhaps it is indicative of a genetic factor although it could be a result of

a dozen other conditions. It is extremely important for anyone experiencing changes/ impairments in memory, cognitive, or behavioral patterns to get a thorough physical and neurological evaluation. There is no individual test for Alzheimer's. The best approach is to undergo a series of tests to exclude other conditions.

There are many benefits to 6. Problems with abstract the evaluation. No one should

suffer needlessly. With the onset of dementia every attempt should be made to determine the originating factor.

Dementia could result from depression, drug interaction, thyroid problems or hormone disorders, nutritional deficiencies, and systemic illnesses. Symptoms can be reversed or halted with early diagnosis and treatment.

drift away. Find out what services are available in the community and make a pact with each family member to accept outside help when the responsibility becomes too much to manage. Far too many families have ended up in a crisis situation because they insisted on providing care in isolation. Introduce services slowly, adding to the care plan when the need increases.

Other top priority items for Senator DiDomenico that were included in the Fiscal Year 2019 Senate Budget and will benefit Chelsea residents

* \$4.8M for the state's pediatric palliative care network- a \$1M increase over FY19- to ensure there is no wait list for these critical services so children and their families have the extra care and support that they need;

* \$350 per child clothing allowance to help low-income families meet their basic needs

The FY 2020 budget furthers regional equity and supports cities and towns by directing significant resources to local and regional aid. Local investments include:

* \$18M for the Massachusetts Cultural Council to support local arts, culture and creauve economy initiatives

* \$18.1M for local Councils on Aging to strengthen programs and services in senior centers in communities across the state

* \$11M for Shannon Grants, which are distributed * \$48.3M for assistance for to municipalities for youth gang violence prevention

A Conference Committee will now convene to reconcile the differences between the Senate budget and the version passed by the House of Representatives in April. Fiscal Year 2020 begins on July 1, 2019.

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

THE THREE MUSKETEERS

"All for one, and one for all." That's Alexandre Dumas Pere's hue and cry in "The Three Musketeers," his 1844 historic adventure novel of intrigue, betrayal, bravery, loyalty, and brotherhood, set in 1625-8.

At Greater Boston Stage Company, the award-winning Stoneham theater joined hands with Front Porch Arts Collective, a newly-formed company composed of predominantly black and brown actors, to create an innovative, comedic take on Dumas' swashbuckling novel.

According to their statement, Front Porch Arts Collective theater company, in residence at Central Square Theater, Cambridge, is "Boston's only professional black and brown arts organization dedicated to combating racism through theater."

Directed by Front Arts Porch Collective founder-director, Dawn M.Simmons, Catherine Bush's farce, recently performed by the Classical Theater of Harlem, is the inaugural production of Front Porch's Giving Voice:



The Foundation Trust Drama Series, featuring "playwrights from traditionally under-represented communities with the theater industry, including women, people of color, members of the LGBTQ community and disabled persons."

Allegedly, actors are selected for roles they are best suited to play and diminishes criticism for not hiring actors of color, advanced age, or similar reasons.

Sometimes, casting actors in cross-gender or cross-race roles works. Sometimes it doesn't. Other times, it doesn't make a difference.

Fulfilling their all-inclusive casting mission, this production in Stoneham injects humor, gender- and race-bending, portraying the timeless, dashing, do-good heroes. Paige Clark portrays musketeer Aramis; Lindsay Allyn Cox is Athos; and James Ri-

Bruins look ahead

With the 2018-19 season considered by management to have been successful, even though not winning the Stanley Cup Championship, it is now time to look forward to the 2019-20 regular season which begins in 106 days from today (Thursday). This week saw a pair of end-of-season press conferences, one with Boston Bruins Chairman Jeremy Jacobs, Bruins CEO Charlie Jacobs and Bruins President Cam Neely, plus a second one with Bruins General Manager Don Sweeney and Bruins Coach Bruce Cassidy.

The overall consensus was that the season exceeded expectations. Neely responded to the question regarding building this team away from the core group...he responded with: "We always have to continue to look at how to make our club better. Regardless if you win the last game or not, you still want to look at what you can do to improve your hockey club. We didn't win the last game, so we weren't good enough. We have to look at how we can improve. Coming into next year, we have to learn from this year. We can certainly try and enjoy the year even though it's difficult when you don't win that last game, especially Game 7 to win it all. It's heartbreaking, really. You feel for the guys, everything they put through the whole season, playing hurt, you know, not only how hard it is to get in, but also, how hard it is to get to the Finals. But we have to move on from that and look at our club and see where we can make improvements."

The monumental list of injured Boston players participating in the Stanley Cup Finals and losing in Game 7, raises the question of age. The core group has Zdeno Chara (42), Patrice Bergeron (34), David Krejci (33), and Brad Marchand (31). This prompted Neely to state: "When we hired GM Don Sweeney, that was certainly a conversation about how to do we take this ed free agents (UFA): Marcus core that won in '11 and give them another opportunity to win while they're still somewhat in their prime, and we still look at it that way. Our players are now one year older, and we're another year removed from winning in '11, so we certainly have recognized what we have coming, what we need to have coming, and who - you know, we're talking pretty big shoes to fill. So, we're certainly aware of that, and we recognize that. We still think they've got some good hockey left in them, but we certainly know that it's winding down, so to speak."

Sweeney used his podium time to explain about the upcoming draft, and the trade rumors swirling around regarding Torey Krug. "There's a lot of depth in the early part of the draft, particular at center. We're not drafting that position, so I'm not going to give up what we just chased from that standpoint. If we can move into the top part, yeah, I would probably look to draft a centerman as a replacement down the road. I think that

[Jack] Studnicka is a player who has offensive attributes. We're going to see him be a pro this year and develop. He won't be rushed along. He's got areas of his game he needs to continue to evolve and get stronger. Again, (Trent) Frederic is another centerman, so we have depth within the organization, but it's hard to replace those guys. Those guys are elite, elite hockey players and have been such for a long period of time. Generally, you have to select them, draft them, develop them and put them in there and let them grow."

As for Krug's importance to the team: "Torey's an important part of our hockey club. Really was proud of his effort, took to heart being in a top-four role this year, in the playoffs in particular where he was going to face matchups on the road, and he handled them really well. The power plays, the points, those things speak for themselves and have been throughout his time here. He's a big part of our club. We have opportunity starting July 1 to open up talks. Again, the RFA market and some of our internal things will dictate the timing of those conversations. If somebody blew us away, you know, every player has to be looked at in that way when you're an organization you just have to. You're doing yourself a disservice if you don't, but it would take a pretty unique opportunity for us to part with Torey. We think he's a big part of the fabric of our group. He's kind of that next wave of leadership that we talk about in behind some of the guys that have carried that mantle for a long time, but he's an important part of our

First up on the agenda in importance would be an attempt to reach extensions for restricted, soon to become restricted free agents (RFA), notably - Charlie McAvoy, Brandon Carlo and Danton Heinen. Among the unrestrict-Johansson, Noel Acciari, and Steve Kampfer are three talented players who will likely

get a look from other teams. A benefit of playing to a Game 7 of the fourth round means that the off-season will be a short one. Start a new mindset with the 2019-20 preseason schedule, which has already been announced by the Bruins. The team will play three games on home ice, and three on the road, beginning Monday, September 16 at 7:00pm vs. the New Jersey Devils at Prudential Center, Newark, Thursday, September 19 at 7:00pm vs. the Philadelphia Flyers at Wells Fargo Center, Philadelphia; Saturday, September 21 at 8:30pm versus the Chicago Blackhawks at United Center, Chicago; Monday, September 23 at 7:00pm vs. Philadelphia Flyers at TD Garden; Wednesday, September 25 at 7:00pm vs. New Jersey Devils at TD Garden; and Saturday, September 28 at 3:00pm vs. Chicago Blackhawks at TD Garden, Boston.
