City Election ballot set with interesting races around the city

The City Election ballot for November has been set for City Council and School Committee, and it features several intriguing races – and one blockbuster Preliminary Election on Sept. 24 in District 2.

The City Clerk's Office has concluded the certification process this month, and one of the most interesting outcomes is a Preliminary Election for District 2.

filed signatures for the Powderhorn Hill district, and the campaigns will begin to take shape immediately.

Incumbent Councilor Luis Tejada has filed his signatures, and he will once again face challenger Olivia Ann Walsh – an attorney who lives at the Soldiers' Home and ran against Tejada two years ago.

The interesting new candidate is Melinda Vega Maldonado, who is the daughter of Chelsea Collaborative Director Gladys Vega and the wife of a Chelsea Police officer.

Those three in the race are all very well-known in the City and will hustle for votes around the district. The outcome will leave only the top two vote getters to square off in November.

The at-large Council race will also be interesting, but Hall - and the head of the will not come up for a vote until November.

Encore Boston Harbor set to give away sports car

Encore Boston Harbor is looking to put a little pizzazz in the Labor Day weekend with a full day of giveaways and fun on Sunday, Sept. 1, a day that will culminate with a drawing to give away a McLaren sportscar.

Encore President Bob De-Salvio said the giveaway will mark the first big day at the resort casino built on a major drawing. The winner will get a 2019 McLaren 5702 Spider (valued at \$200,000), or the option of \$100,000 cash.

"The car is a big one for us," he said. "The final drawing will be around 7 p.m., but we'll have preliminary drawings all afternoon. We start accepting entries at noon that day and there are drawings all the way from 2 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. We want to get a lot of people involved."

The promotion will feature 10 people drawn from the entries every 30 minutes. Nine of the 10 names will get \$500 in credits, and the 10th name will get a slot in the final drawing for the car.

"At the end, we take all the finalists and draw the winner," said DeSalvio. "They can take the car or the cash. The others that don't win will get \$2,500 in credits."

There will also be a second-chance drawing at 8 p.m.

New Supt. Abeyta ready to take charge of Chelsea Public Schools

The corner office in City Chelsea Public Schools – will have a new look and some new ideas now that incoming Supt. Almi Abeyta has taken her place as the leader of the schools, ready to welcome faculty and students on Aug. 27 for their - and her - first day of school.

After a public process last spring, Abeyta was chosen by the School Committee after a close vote, but in deciding fashion, and she reported to work on Aug. 12. This week, with former Supt. Mary Bourque still on the job to help with the transition, Abeyta has been meeting with staff and learning all about Chelsea after having left her position this summer at Somerville High School.

"I've just been listening a lot so far – getting to know people," she said. "It's one thing to read about a district – a plan – but it's a whole other thing to see it in action. What I was reading about online and hearing about in the interview process - now I'm seeing it play out and it's refreshing to see there is alignment between the two. In education, there is theory in action and

theory in use. I'm seeing both working together in Chelsea Public Schools.

That was a refreshing take from the new leader of the schools as she accompanied Bourque around the district - meeting with teachers on Monday for professional development sessions at the Early Learning Center.

Abeyta comes to the district with a great deal of experience in and around Chelsea, living

in Revere and having taught in leadership positions at East Boston and Somerville.

"This process was for me a long time coming," she said in a recent interview. "I just couldn't pass up Chelsea. I drove through Chelsea every day to Somerville from Revere. I really wanted to serve a community like Chelsea. When I saw it was open, I said I have to do this. I felt it was a perfect step for me professionally and personally...Having been in East Boston, Chelsea felt like home to me. It is me. It feels right and where I am supposed to be."

Abeyta grew up mostly in New Mexico in a military family, having spent time in various places around the world before settling there. After attending public schools all her life, she eventually made her way to the East Coast and went to graduate school at Harvard University. During that process, she had interned at the Donald McKay Elementary in Eastie. Intending to move on after that, she was heavily recruited by the Boston Public Schools (BPS) to take the principal job at the McKay – and she served there for four years before taking a

Robert S. Repucci, executive director of CAPIC for the past 41 years, will be retiring from the agency that assists residents and seniors in Chelsea, Revere, and Winthrop.

Repucci, who has worked at CAPIC in various capacities since 1972, publicly announced his decision in a letter to friends Tuesday. He had informed the CAPIC Board of Directors at a meeting last Thursday.

Repucci, 68, said he will remain in the position until a successor is named. The succession plan to select a new CAPIC executive director has begun, and starting next week the position will be advertised in various newspapers and on social media platforms.

Chelsea community leaders lauded Repucci's many accomplishments at CAPIC. He has been the much-revered leader of the agency for decades and has always supported local organizations with his attendance at their events. CAPIC became a national model during his tenure.

"Bob Repucci's retirement is a loss for the region and a loss for the city of Chelsea," said City Manager Tom Ambrosino, who also worked closely with CAPIC when he was mayor of Revere. "Bob has been a tremendous partner to Chelsea, particularly over the last few years as we've ramped up our efforts to address a lot of the social ills in the downtown.

"A lot of our success in the past few years is due to Bob's efforts, and he will be greatly missed," added Ambrosino.

Councillor-at-Large Leo Robinson, whose relationship with Bob Repucci goes back to 1972, said, "Bob is a great person and I have nothing but respect for the man as he has a heart of gold."

GreenRoots Executive Director Roseann Bongiovanni said Repucci's important legacy will continue in the city.

"Bob Repucci has dedicated years of his life to help some of Chelsea's most needy and most vulnerable," said Bongiovanni, a former Chel-

Encore, strong July in table games

The state released the first full month of gaming revenue figures for Encore Boston Harbor on Aug. 15, and it revealed that the resort casino is showing strong on table games, is a little weak on slots and had almost \$300 million wagered in the month.

The first revenue reports for Encore last month contained only one week's worth of revenues, so the July report was much anticipated and showed overall strength in total wagers and in table games.

The casino had \$289.4 million wagered in slots and table games, and logged total gross gaming revenues of \$48.5 million. That resulted in \$12.1 million going to the state for taxes.

In particular, the table games showed strength, reporting gross gaming revenues of \$27.4 million.

The slot gross gaming revenues were at \$21.15 million, with a 90.5 percent payout. There was a total coin in amount on the slots at \$262.4 million.

At the same time, MGM Springfield showed a total wager amount of \$184.5 million, with gross gaming revenues of \$20.39 million – less than half of what Encore produced in the same period. Noticeably, MGM's table games were far

lower than Encore, coming in at \$4.88 million, which was nearly seven times lower than at Encore.

Paul DeBole, a professor at Lasell College and a gaming expert, said he viewed the results with interest. He said the table games were very strong, but the slot revenues were weaker than expected.

"The table games number is much larger than was anticipated," he said. "A good number for table games is around 25 to 33 percent. They were at 56.45 percent. That gives the indication there is a lot of table game traffic."

However, he said the opposite is true for the slot machines.

"Logging \$21 million for the slot machines was pretty unimpressive for the first month," he said.

He said they averaged about \$216 per machine per day, with the gold-standard of success in the industry being about \$300 per machine per

"If a gaming machine is doing \$300 per machine per day, they are happy," he said.

The same weakness showed in Springfield too, with them coming in at \$196 per machine per day. Contrary to that, he said Plainridge Park did well on its slots (it is only allowed slot machines). That

Chelsea's Feliz twins help Phunk win national title

The Phunk Phenonemon junior dance team has struck gold once again.

Chelsea had its share of contributors to Phunk's national championship performance. Phunk is coached by Chelsea High graduate and former New England Patriots cheerleader Reia Briggs-Con-

For Briggs-Connor, owner of the Phunk Phenomenon Dance Complex in Everett, it was her sixth national title and the second consecutive crown in the Junior Division.

"It was a full sold-out audience each time they performed," said Briggs-Connor, daughter of Barbara Casino of Chelsea. "It was amazing. There were 53 countries there and we took ninth in the worlds."

One of the most spectacular dancers for Phunk is Aaron Connor, 9-year-old son of Reia Briggs-Connor and Everett Police Officer Rick Con-

"It's pretty cool to have your son on the team," said Reia. "His nana still lives in Chelsea. I'm proud of him. It was a great kickoff to our dance season."

Chelsea also had two identical twin sisters, 11-year-olds Mya and Madyson Feliz, excelling for the Phunk contingent. They are the daughters of former Chelsea High basketball star Charol Soto, (who played on the school's greatest team ever alongside Autumn Lopez and Denise Chappell), and Jovanny Feliz.

"Madyson and are from Chelsea and I'm so proud of them since I'm a Chelsea girl myself," said Reia.

Madyson said she has been dancing at Reia's studio since she was five years old. She said it was exciting to be on a national championship team.

"It felt really good to win because I've been training for a lot of years and it actually paid off," said Madyson, who showed her talents with a backhand spring during the routine. "I like dancing a lot. It's my passion and it's just really fun and I just like to do it. It's fun having my sister dancing with me."

Maydson praised Coach Reia, saying, "She's really nice and caring and wants to help everybody. She's just a great teacher."

Charol Soto traveled to Arizona to watch her daughters win a national championship.

"I'm happy that my mother was there," said Madyson, who has performed with L'il Phunk at Boston Celtics games. "She helps a lot and makes sure that everything is organized."

Mya Feliz said the hard work paid off the team.

"I was really excited because the hard work all summer paid off," said Mya. "We could have been doing something else but I'm glad I was dancing.'

Mya said it was "unbelievable" when the announcement was made that Phunk had won the gold medal.

"I couldn't believe it," said Mya, who with her sister, simultaneously executed the backhand spring in the routine. "I was starting to cry a little bit because I was so happy."



WHAT HAPPENED TO OUR **RED SOX, NATION?**

After 2018's record-setting season in which our Red Sox won the most regular-season games (108) in their history and then vanquished the Yankees, Astros, and Dodgers in the post-season by a combined 11-3 en route to winning the World Series, it seemed that the sky was the limit for 2019.

We had the "best" manager in Alex Cora, guiding a group of young and exciting players -- led by Mookie, J.D., Xander, Andrew, and Rafael -- as well as a pitching staff -- paced by the "unhitttable" Chris Sale -- that seemed destined to repeat as world champions.

But a funny thing happened from the end of 2018 to the beginning of 2019: Our Sox came down to earth.

When they did not re-sign their closer, Craig Kimbrel, perhaps the most essential position in baseball today, and then opened the season with a 2-8 start, it was evident that 2019 was not going to be a repeat of 2018.

Injuries piled up, pitchers went on and off the IL, and the magic of 2018 never reappeared. Mookie's ever-beaming smile had been replaced with the grimace of defeat.

As we write this, the Sox stand at 67-59, six games behind Tampa Bay in the extra wild-card spot, with Oakland in between.

In addition, they have a killer schedule in their final 36 games. And with Chris Sale essentially out for the rest of the season, the Sox' chances (which stand at 2.8 percent) of making the playoffs are shortening every day as surely as summer's fading sun. And even if they do make it, will they really be any match for any of the other playoff teams?

For young Red Sox fans, the disappointment of 2019 offers a life lesson: When you're on top, everybody wants to take you

For those of us who have seen this all before, the saga of the 2019 Red Sox brings to mind the line from the Impossible Dream record of the 1967 season (and yes, we still have our well-worn, vinyl album, as well as a CD of it) that has summed up so many Red Sox seasons both before and since:

When drug prices mean more than sick patients

The Department of Health and Human Services has a new plan to cut drug spending. But it's not a change for the better.

To lower spending in Medicare Part B -- the component of Medicare that covers advanced, physician-administered medicines -- the agency plans to tie U.S. drug prices to the artificially low prices paid in other countries.

This would harm patients. Price controls may save the government money in the short term, but they would slow the rate of medical prog-

In most developed countries, the government dictates the price of prescription drugs. Governments use this power to pinch pennies, often at the expense of providing access to the newest breakthrough medicines.

Creating just a single new medicine costs an average of \$1.7 billion and can take more than a decade. And only a to cover their research and development costs -- much less

into new medicines.

If the government decides drug prices, drug developers will have a harder time recouping those investments -- making investment less appealing. Progress towards therapies for illnesses like Alzheimer's and cancer would slow. New drug launches would become rare.

U.S. patients currently have better access to the newest drugs than any other country. Consider that 89 percent of 290 new drugs released handful of drugs sell enough between 2011 and 2018 were available in the United States at the time of their initial subsidize ongoing research launch. By contrast, German

patients had access to only 62 percent of these medicines.

Delayed access to new drugs is the unfortunate reality for too many people around the world. If we import their policies, we will import their diminished access to new drugs as well.

HHS's reform puts the financial interests of the federal government before the well-being of actual patients.

Legislature passes balanced budget with targeted investments in education, housing, environment

along with his colleagues in the Massachusetts Legislature, passed its Fiscal Year 2020 (FY20) budget recently, which invests in programs and services across the Commonwealth. Funded at \$43.1 billion, the budget makes major investments in education, housing, substance use disorder services, health care, and other areas while projecting a more than \$476 million deposit into the Stabilization Fund – bringing the fund's balance to more than \$3 billion to safeguard the future of vital programs and services.

"I am proud of this fiscally responsible budget that supports the needs of individuals, families, and communities across the Commonwealth through thoughtful investments that increase local aid, strengthen our health care system and protect the environment," said House Speaker Robert A. DeLeo (D-Winthrop). "This budget bolsters our ongoing efforts to combat

State Rep. Dan Ryan, the opioid crisis, invest in high-quality early education and care and makes another significant deposit into the state's Stabilization Fund. These investments will have a long and lasting positive effect on the residents of Massachusetts. I want to thank Chair Michlewitz for his leadership and my colleagues in the House, especially those on the conference committee, who worked to put this package together."

State Rep. Dan Ryan said he was very happy to see the overall investments in the State Budget, particularly in education funding, and he said his district also made out very well this year with several earmarks in the budget.

The budget increases Unrestricted General Government Aid (UGGA) by nearly \$30 million and provides \$5.17 billion in Chapter 70 education funding as part of a \$268 million increase for investments in schools over Fiscal Year 2019. In addition, the budget includes a \$10.5 million reserve for low-income students while the Joint Committee on Education continues its work on this issue. It also addresses the need for integrated student health and wellness supports, providing \$2 million to establish the Supporting Health Alliances Reinforcing Education (SHARE) grant program to address non-academic bar-

riers to school success. The investments into Head Start budget expands the role of the Office of the Child Advocate to oversee integrated coordination of education and health programming. Additional education allocations include:

- \$345 million for Special
- Education reimbursement; • \$115 million for Charter
- School Reimbursement; and • \$75.8 million for Regional School Transportation re-

imbursement. The budget builds on the Legislature's commitment to ensuring children have access to high-quality early education and care (EEC). The budget invests in those who work with children by increasing rates for early education providers by \$20 million and supporting continuing education opportunities with community colleges. The conference report provides \$7.5 million for the Commonwealth Preschool Partnership Initiative to expand access across the Commonwealth. The budget also includes additional

grants and quality improvement measures in core EEC programming.

The budget represents some of the biggest increases seen in a generation when it comes to housing and homelessness funding. Access to safe, adequate, and affordable housing is essential and provides the foundation from which families and individuals can lead successful lives. This year, the budget continues these efforts by providing:

•\$116 million for the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program (MRVP);

- •\$72 million for Public Housing Subsidies;
- •\$8 million for Alternative Housing Voucher Program;
- •\$53.4 million for Homeless individual shelters.

The budget continues make investments in the Commonwealth's efforts to fight the opioid epidemic – a public health crisis that has touched nearly every household across

the Commonwealth. To help those in need, the budget gives all EMS and ambulance companies access to discounted naloxone, making it more available for use in the field. In addition, the budget includes:

•\$150.2 million for the Bureau of Substance Addiction Services, which will help create five new recovery centers across Massachusetts and support substance use disorder workforce initiatives; and

•\$5.5M for a comprehensive statewide strategy for community-based harm reduction services.

For the first time in nearly 20 years, the budget will increase the Commonwealth's contribution into the Community Preservation Act, which will ensure that over \$36 million more will be distributed to projects all across the Commonwealth and help raise the state's match up to 30 percent for investments in open space, affordable housing and historic preservation.



Teaching More Than Just Dance: Nicole Zervas Dance Academy

Nicole Paolo, director of Nicole Zervas Dance Academy (NZDA), started dancing as a way to express emotion a tool of communication. She opened her studio with the same goal in mind, with the help from her director, Sharon Tirrell, Paolo opened Nicole Zervas Dance Academy in 1989.

Throughout the next 30 years, she has watched her "students grow. Both emotionally and through their dance skill; and learn to have confidence in themselves and to be proud of who they are." Paolo commented on how inspiring it is for her to be apart of that growth.

The NZDA studio is now coming on their 30th season, but regardless of what anniversary is being celebrated, the reason she started danc-

Paolo is always reflecting on the previous year in order to improve her next recital. There is a key focus on growth that NZDA continues to act on, bettering all aspects of the

Paolo describes this as striving to better the studio without comparing NZDA to other surrounding dance schools: "I respect all of the other dance directors and schools . . . [I] hope that we can all share the love of dance together."

With this in mind, NZDA

began hosting a Dance-A-Thon for Dana Farber Cancer Institute for the past two years. Last year, the studio brought surrounding schools together to raise money for cancer research through the art of dance. By dancing for a cause, it reminded Paolo of ing: communication:

"one voice, one mission," She commented on bringing hundreds of students together for this event.

Nicole Zervas offers a variety of classes for ages as young as 18 months - Tiniest Toes, where the child is accompanied by a parent or guardian during the time. As the child gets older, they enter Tiny Toes and perform in a recital at the end of June. From there, multiple classes are available including ballet, tap, jazz, hiphop, and tumbling. For older students, Latin, contemporary, pre-pointe, and pointe are also offered.

Paolo said she does not believe "dance should be judged with a trophy . . . dance is an art form." So while there are many classes offered, NZDA does not have a competition

team. Dance is a personal art, in her eyes, and that the individual should be valued with movement rather than awards.

Though each student goes through a process of weekly classes, hard work, memorization, and dedication to prepare for the annual recital, the studio offers much more than dance. At Nicole Zervas, the students learn self-discipline, time management, and life balance between activities, school, friends, and family. It helps children become well-rounded, giving them skills they will use for a lifetime.

The students are also offered other opportunities to dance other than the recital, including the Madonna Della Cava Feast in the North End and occasionally Dance The World Disney events, to show-

Gianna Chianca, a current senior for this upcoming dance season, has danced for NZDA since she was three years old. She currently takes almost all classes that are available, and has grown to love contemporary dance. As this is her senior year, Chianca commented on the family-like friendships she

has made and how hard it will be to graduate and leave the studio. However, she hopes to return as an alumnus and down the road, a teacher.

YELLOW BUS ROUTES FOR SY2019-2020

Chelsea Schools Redesigns Yellow Bus Routes for Upcoming School Year to Reduce Student Waitlist

This year, while Chelsea elementary school students will be waiting for their buses at the District's wellknown and well-used bus stops, they may find that a different bus number will arrive when compared to last year. That is because this summer, District staff redesigned the yellow bus routes serving the Mary C. Burke Elementary School Complex to maximize the number of students who have seats on the first day of school and dramatically reduce the number on the wait list. "This year, we looked at the ridership data and created the bus routes from scratch so that we could get the greatest number of elementary school students into bus seats on the first day of school", said Dr. Mary M. Bourque, Superintendent of Schools. That means that this year two buses will start their routes in Prattville where a large number of students live. Another will begin on Admiral's Hill. The new routes should also help reduce traffic congestion as fewer buses will be crossing past each other on their way to pick up children.

Letters have been mailed to the families of all students who have assigned seats on the buses starting next week. In the letters are laminated tags with the student's first name, bus stop, and bus number. The District is asking that these tags be attached to the students' backpacks so they can be easily identified as

"We do have approximately 100 families who still have not brought in proof of address to the Parent Information Center and we strongly encourage them to bring their materials in as quickly as possible so their child can get a seat on the bus", said Daniel Mojica, Director of the Parent Information Center. The District estimates that most of these students can still get a seat, but if a particular route is full, they may
