Chelsea Street **Bridge** meeting brings federal delegation, Coast **Guard together**

On Saturday, Jan. 25, GreenRoots organized a meeting regarding the Chelsea Street Bridge. Residents of Chelsea and East Boston gathered with representatives from MassPort, the Coast Guard and local, state and federal-level politicians to push for action around the frequent and disruptive closures of the Chelsea Street Bridge. The was the first event about the Bridge, led by community rather than by state officials such as MassDOT.

MassDOT was invited to attend, but declined the invitation.

Community members from both sides of the Creek gave testimonies that highlighted the impact of the bridge on people's everyday lives. Commuters recounted their experiences waiting in traffic for over an hour, because the bridge went up during rush hour and backed up the hundreds of vehicles that were trying to cross the bridge at that

CPD reminds residents of new hands-free law for drivers

Chief Brian Kyes and the Chelsea Police Department would like to remind residents of the upcoming hands-free law for drivers.

On Feb. 23, An Act Requiring the Hands-Free Use of Mobile Telephones While Driving will go into effect prohibiting drivers from using cellphones and other hand-held devices while operating a vehicle. There will be a grace period through March 31 in which drivers will get a warning for their first violation rather than a fine.

The law states that no motor vehicle operator may use electronic devices while driving unless the technology is being used hands-free. Operators found to be texting, dialing phone numbers or using a phone with their hands in any capacity while driving will be fined.

Operators are permitted to use hands-free technology including Bluetooth, "single tap or swipe" to activate or deactivate handsfree mode, navigation technology mounted to the

City reacts quickly to water main break on Sagamore Avenue

City Manager Thomas Ambrosino said the broken underground pipe that caused torrents of water to roll down Sagamore Avenue Saturday morning has been fully repaired.

"Everything is back to normal," said Ambrosino. "Our contractors were on the scene and the pipe was fixed by the end of the day."

Sagamore Avenue residents awoke Saturday to see their street inundated with water gushing from the broken pipe located between Cheever and Murray Streets. Chelsea Police and Chelsea Fire personnel arrived on the scene, with police officers setting up a roadblock to allow emergency crews unimpeded access to dig up the street and repair the pipe.

City Engineer Louis Mammolette explained the cause of the break during an interview on scene.

Mending fences

Councilor Vidot, Fire Union make peace following confrontation after 2019 vote on insurance changes

A major dust up in 2019 between former Council President Damali Vidot and members of the Chelsea Firefighters Union has been resolved with mediation and apologies after a long investigation - one that some councillors feel was an unwarranted expen-

Councillor Vidot told the Record this week that the investigation of wrongdoing conducted by the City at a current cost of \$46,000 has been resolved with mediation - a process where the Union has issued an apology and Vidot has said she could have done things a little better during a Council vote on changes to City insurance plans in 2019.

"What I was trying to do is to hold people serving in

Public Safety to a level of accountability to our residents," she said. "I know if I kept going with the investigation, the investigators would have probably suggested a reprimand. They asked if I was open to mediation and Union President Brian Capistran said he should have said something sooner and gotten control of the matter. I admit the way we handled the vote wasn't the best and wasn't transparent and not the way I want to lead. I want to put this behind us and move on in 2020."

She noted that Capistran was very professional with her at all times, and respectful as well. She said it was two specific members of the Union that crossed the line in her opinion.

Congressman Joe Kennedy III hosts Spanish-language town hall

U.S Rep Joe Kennedy III hosted a Spanish-langauge town hall this Saturday at Veronica Robles Cultural Center in East Boston. Kennedy, who is challenging Sen. Ed Markey in a primary race for U.S Senate, took questions from an audience of Spanish-speaking community members for nearly an hour.

Chelsea City Councilor Judith Garcia, who has endorsed Kennedy, introduced the Congressman to a room full of Spanish-speaking residents from East Boston, Chelsea, and other towns and cities in the area. (See story on page 3). Voters had the opportunity to ask the Congressman questions regarding his candidacy, positions and priorities without the filter of a translator.

Kennedy said that the East Boston town hall, along with another Spanish-language town hall hosted the same day in Lawrence, were about showing up for people in Massachusetts who are all too often left out of the political process.

"Since day one of this campaign we have been committed to showing up for every voter of Massachusetts and meeting people where they are,' Kennedy said. "At a time

when too many people feel ignored and cut out of our political process, we are building as inclusive, transparent and accessible of a grassroots operation as we can. With the growing base of Latinx voters across our commonwealth and country and their immense contributions to every corner of American life — these town halls are an essential early part of our campaign, to directly hear the concerns, challenges, hopes and lived experience of every resident."

After the town hall, Kennedy joined State Sen. Joe Boncore and other local elected officials for a Meet and Greet at Pazza on Porter. Sen. Boncore, who represents East Boston, Cambridge, Revere and Winthrop, formally endorsed Kennedy in his bid for Senate in front of a restaurant full of support-

The two Spanish-language town halls are the first of their kind in the history of Massachusetts Senate races, and they conclude the first stage of Kennedy's 2020 community town hall tour. To date, Kennedy has completed 11 town halls over the last month, including: Worcester, Malden, Lowell, Barnstable, Salem, Dedham, Amherst, Springfield, Framingham, Leominster, Randolph.

Fire Union officials declined to comment on the resolution, but they did issue an official letter of apology in the matter.

"We still believe the City Council poorly handled that public session," wrote Capistran. "However, notwithstanding our discontent with the process, I concede that the conduct of some of our members and allies was inappropriate, disrespectful and unprofessional. Public employees should never engage in shouting and aggressive behavior towards members of the City Council. For that behavior, I apologize on behalf of the Union. I regret that I did not exhibit more leadership in controlling this reaction. I hope we can all understand it was in the heat of the moment over a very contentious issue that affects all

City employees." The genesis of the situation came in 2019 when the City Manager was trying to save money on health insurance costs. He had tried to make changes to the percentages previously, but it was rejected. However, he did ask the Council to give him authority to make changes to plan design to save money. That vote was on the agenda the night in question, and the room was packed with mostly Police and Fire Union personnel, many of whom expected to let their feelings be known during the Public Speaking portion at the beginning of the meeting.

However, former Councillor Bob Bishop called to move the question to a vote before Public Speaking, and Vidot allowed it. That triggered the voted and also a lot of anger – as Union members weren't afforded an opportunity to speak before the vote.

After the vote, there was

a huge confrontation in the hallway outside the Council, with some firefighters screaming and threatening Vidot, she said.

"One of the men said, 'Don't call us when your house is on fire," she said. "It's one thing when you hear systemic racism or institutional racism, but it's another thing when you have an older white male on the Fire Department screaming at you and saying they won't come if your house is on fire. I moved on at first, but was bothered by

That triggered an investigation when Vidot went to City Manager Tom Ambrosino. A retired judge conducted the investigation, and a private investigator was hired, and surveillance video was reviewed from City Hall. There were several hearings that went for many hours before mediation was suggested.

All of that cost money, and City Solicitor Cheryl Watson Fisher confirmed the costs at the moment are approximately \$46,000. Current Council President Roy Avellaneda said he isn't happy that Vidot used City resources to investigate a matter that started with her own mistakes.

"As current city council president, my focus right now is on what the cost of this investigation was and how there was no input by the Council as a whole to approve or deny the expenditure of nearly \$50,000 of taxpayer money on outside legal fees," he said. "I am already on record as saying that the use of bush league parliamentary procedures by then-President Vidot and former Councilor Bishop to circumvent the opportunity for city union employees to address the City Council and public prior to vote on

providing the city manager additional negotiation powers was one of the saddest chapters in City Council history."

He said he expects that there will be a matter before the Council in the near future to request payment to outside legal counsel for the investigation. At that time, he said there will be a robust discussion.

"The amount of money spent on a fruitless investigation could have been better spent in my opinion on hiring an additional 20 Chelsea youths for our city summer employment program," he said. "When the matter of transferring additional funds for outside legal services comes up to the Council this year, you can be assured that this matter will be discussed and that safeguards are put in place so that tax dollars are no longer wasted for personal agendas."

Vidot said she was bothered by the behavior and requested the investigation because she felt that those yelling at her needed to be held accountable. After all, she reasoned, if they were willing to yell at the City Council president, how might they treat a resident with limited English skills, or another woman of color without political power. It was a moment, she said, where she felt she needed to lead.

"I'm grateful the City Manager was willing to support me and dedicate resources toward the investigation when I grew concerned of threats I received," she said. "While many of the bully behaviors I've received as a Councilor are reflective of an old Chelsea; they no longer represent the progress we've made as a community not our shared values."

shared their concerns about children who were stranded at school after hours when their parents got stuck in traffic at the bridge. City Manager Tom Ambrosino and City Councillors Judith Garcia and Enio Lopez spoke about the impact of the bridge on Chelsea as a whole and pleaded with federal representatives to take action to address the situation.

Residents also presented ideas for solutions, including improving communication with commuters, and imposing blackout periods on bridge lifts during rush hours. The overall message was that community members face constant stress and uncertainty about the bridge, and need a guarantee that they can travel freely for some window of time during the morning and the evening commutes. Al-

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

Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) will undergo a comprehensive evaluation visit March 29 - April 1, 2020, by a team representing the New England Commission of Higher Education (formerly the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, NEASC).

The New England Commission of Higher Education is one of seven accrediting commissions in the United States that provide institutional accreditation on a regional basis. Accreditation is voluntary and applies to the institution as a whole. The Commission, which is recognized by the U.S. Department of Education, accredits approximately 220 institutions in the six-state New England region as well as several American-style institutions overseas.

BHCC has been accredited by the Commission since 1976 and was last reviewed in 2010. Its accreditation by the Commission encompasses the entire institution.

For the past year and a half, BHCC has been engaged in a process of self-study, addressing the Commission's Standards for Accreditation. An evaluation team will visit the institution to gather evidence that the self-study is thorough and accurate. The team will recommend to the Commission a continuing status for the institution. Following a review process, the Commission itself will take the final action.

car's dash and phone use in emergency situations. Drivers may use their phones if they are stationary and not in an active traffic lane.

The penalty for drivers who are found guilty of violating the hands-free law is a \$100 fine for a first offense, a \$250 fine for a second offense and a \$500 fine for a third or subsequent offense. Operators who commit a second or subsequent offense are also required to complete an educational program focused on distracted driving prevention.

lation will count as a surchargeable incident which can affect the driver's insurance rates.

"We hope that this new law will improve road safety by reminding drivers the importance of putting their phones away when behind the wheel," Chief Kyes said. "Distracted driving has become a serious issue, and encouraging drivers to pay close attention to their surroundings should reduce the number of accidents that take place on the roads."

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

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HAVE WE TURNED A CORNER?

For the first time since 2014, life expectancy in the United States has risen after four years of decline, according to a report released this past Thursday by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Overall life expectancy rose to 78.7 years in 2018, a slight increase from 2017, when life expectancy stood at

Despite the increase, life expectancy in the U.S only stands at where it did in 2010. In other words, we've had a decade of stagnation in our country's life expectancy, the only Western nation to have no gain in this ultimate measure of national health.

Worse than that however, is this statistic: Life expectancy in the U.S. has fallen behind even poor nations, such as Portugal, Costa Rica, Cuba, and Slovenia, all of whom trailed far behind us in the 1990s. Many factors have contributed to the recent national de-

cline in life expectancy, most notably the opioid crisis, suicides, and alcohol abuse. These are what experts refer to as "deaths of despair," a statistic that has risen dramatically among the American white male population of all ages.

So here's one question: If it is true that we are still amidst the longest economic recovery of all time, why have America's "deaths of despair" reached an all-time In our view, one obvious answer is this: The econom-

ic gains of the past decade have accrued only to the very wealthy, which in turn has resulted in many Americans falling out of the middle class and others not being able Consider that the national minimum wage in the U.S.

presently is a paltry \$7.25. And just how paltry is it? If the increase in the minimum wage had kept pace with the increase in the cost of living for the past 50 years (the minimum wage in 1968 was \$1.60), the minimum wage today would be about \$22.00. If you do the math, the lowest-paid workers in the U.S. should be making at least \$800 per week; instead, they are making only about \$300 per week. However, the working poor are not the only ones who

have been left out of our nation's supposed economic growth. The median household income in the U.S. in 1968 was \$7,700. If that figure had kept pace with the cost of living, the median income today would be more than \$90,000. However, median household income in the U.S. in 2019 was just \$63,000, far below where it should be. So now ponder this thought: If things have remained

bleak for many of our fellow Americans even during the longest economic expansion on record, what will happen when the next recession hits?

The bottom line in America in 2020 simply is this: The very wealthy are getting much wealthier, while everybody else is getting poorer, with the costs of housing, health care, nursing home care for seniors, and a college education increasingly eluding the grasp of the rapidly-sinking American middle-class.

The end result of this economic dislocation can be seen in our national health statistics that show an increase in "deaths of despair" and an overall decline in our national life expectancy.

The stark reality of America in 2020 comes down to this: Americans today are living shorter -- and unhappier

These usually are signs of mild forgetfulness, not serious memory problems, like Alzheimer's disease." www.nia.nih.gov

What's Normal Absentmindedness curs when you aren't paying close attention to the activity at hand. Occasionally forgetting where you placed things. Forgetting facts over time. Like computers, our brains need to purge old data to make room for new. A "tip of the tongue" memory slip that you remember later. Utiliz-

ing reminders to help you remember. Despite memory lapses, if your personality and mood remain the same, it's a good indicator that it's probably not something more serious. That's according to Helena Chang Chui, MD, a neurologist at Keck Medicine of USC.

I lose my car in parking lots, often. Is misplacing your cell phone, purse, or keys part of your daily routine? Do you put special things in special places to not forget, and then forget? The land of the lost has recently claimed a pair of my favorite glasses.

My solutions: Wear mismatched socks on my hands and outsmart the Sock Fairy and the Glove Grinch. Handcuff car keys to my wrist. And buy an old lady eyeglass chain or strap.

"The corrosivity of the clay soil underneath Sagamore Avenue is so aggressive that it attacks the ductile iron material that the pipe is constructed of," said Mammolette. "It actually eats holes in to the underside of the pipe. Once those holes are thin enough that the pressure of the water main inside can push through, it creates a water main break."

Mammolette said the city manager was notified immediately of the emergency situation.

DPW Commissioner Fidel Maltez and DPW workers combined their efforts with Tufts Construction, the city's emergency repair contractor, to repair the broken pipe. Carlos Hernandez, a

co-owner of the home at 59 Sagamore Ave., said his basement took on 17 inches of water in the immediate aftermath of the incident. "I was sleeping this

Supreme Judicial Court Chief Justice Ralph D. Gants calls for increased civil legal aid at Walk to the Hill

Supreme Judicial Court Chief Justice Ralph D. Gants joined hundreds of attorneys, law students and others last week in calling for increased state funding for civil legal aid to vulnerable low income Massachusetts residents in need at the annual Walk to the Hill at the Massachusetts State "The good news is that

the legislature in the past few years has been great to the Massachusetts Legal Corporation; Assistance between fiscal years 2018 and 2020 the legislature has substantially increased amount appropriated to MLAC," Chief Justice Gants said. "We are blessed with a legislature that knows the importance of civil legal aid to this Commonwealth and has acted on that knowledge. Our legislators 'get it'...But that good news is also the bad news, because it means that legal services still turn away more than half of the eligible persons who come to them seeking legal assistance."

Organized by the Equal Justice Coalition, the event called for increased funding for the Massachusetts Legal Assistance Corporation (MLAC), the largest funding source for civil legal aid organizations in the state, by \$5 million in the Fiscal Year 2021 state budget, for a total appropriation of \$29 million.

According to MLAC. legal aid organizations in Massachusetts turned away 57% of eligible residents seeking help in Fiscal Year 2019. Residents whose income is at or below 125% of the federal poverty level (\$32,750/year for a family of four) are eligible for civil legal aid. Last year, civil legal

aid organizations helped 88,000 people. Chief Justice Gants said that civil legal aid organizations were able to expand their ability

to provide individual representation to public school students who face expulsion or suspension, or who were denied the individualized education placement they need to succeed in school; provide greater assistance to released prisoners whose criminal records are hindering their efforts to obtain housing, employment, and the licenses they need to work; and support mothers and their children who have been released from ICE detention and are seeking asylum in the United States.

Chief Justice Gants noted that while civil legal aid organizations were able to help more people last year due to an increase in funding provided by the legislature, the need for civil legal aid for homeowners and tenants, veterans, seniors, and documented and undocumented immigrants remains high.

"Last fiscal year, nearly one-third of all legal aid cases were housing cases -homeowners fighting foreclosure and tenants fighting eviction," Chief Justice Gants said. "Veterans are still serving in foreign wars and leaving military service with a variety of legal issues that are made more difficult by the PTSD and traumatic brain injuries they suffered in protecting our nation. The elderly population continues to grow, as does the number of their legal issues involving elder abuse, MassHealth coverage for nursing home care, protection for those with dementia and Alzheimer's, bankruptcy for those whose lives lasted longer than their savings, and eviction for those with mental health issues manifested by compulsive hoarding."


"Then there is the non-citizen immigrant population, documented and undocumented, which comprises roughly eight percent of Massachusetts residents -- about 550,000 persons,"

Chief Justice Gants said. "With the United States Supreme Court earlier this week lifting the preliminary injunction that stayed implementation of the Trump administration's public charge rule, the federal government might deny green cards to some immigrants who receive public benefits such as Medicaid, food stamps, and housing vouchers."

In addition to Chief Justice Gants, speakers included: Massachusetts Bar Association President John Morrissey; Boston Bar Association President Christine Netski; Louis Tompros, Chair of the Equal Justice Coalition; and Lynne M. Parker, Executive Director of Massachusetts Legal Assistance Corporation. A legal aid client who is a domestic violence survivor shared her story of how South Coastal Counties Legal Services helped her file a restraining order and represented her in

divorce proceedings. Following the speaking portion of the event, those in attendance visited their elected state legislators to encourage them to increase funding in the Fiscal Year 2021 state budget for the Massachusetts Legal Assistance Corporation. The Equal Justice Coalition is a collaboration of the Boston Bar Association, Massachusetts Bar Association, and the Massachusetts Legal Assistance Corporation. The Massachusetts Legal Assistance Corporation was established by the state legislature in 1983 to ensure that low income residents with critical, non-criminal legal matters would have access to legal information, advice and representation. Civil legal aid organizations provide support to individuals in cases related to housing, employment, family law, domestic violence, health care, education, immigration, and protection of seniors, among

other civil matters.

CHS GIRLS TRACK WINS CAC CROWN

The Chelsea High girls indoor track & field team captured its third straight Commonwealth Athletic Conference championship this past Saturday at the Lynn Tech Fieldhouse.

The Lady Red Devils took first place in five of the nine individual events and then won the final event, the 4 x 400 relay, to edge Greater Lowell by a single point, 82-81. The Lynn Tech/Notre Dame team was right behind with 79 points.

This title also marked the last CAC indoor crown for Chelsea, which is switching to the Greater Boston League for the next school year.

Leading the way for the Lady Red Devils with 30 points was senior Stephanie Simon, who won three events, the high hurdles, the 55-meter dash, and the high jump.

Teammate Ana Chang won her specialty, the 600 dash. Ana was named the league MVP for going undefeated in the 600 -- an event Ana had never run before this year -- by a typical margin of victory in the range of 12-15 seconds. In addition, Chang spearheaded the victorious Chelsea 4 x 400 relay team, which also was undefeated this season.

Gloria Rodriguez, who won all of her league meets this year, brought home the other first-place finish for the Lady Red Devils in her specialty, outsprinting the field in the 300 dash. Gloria also ran a leg of the 4 x 400 relay.

Among the unsung heroes for Chelsea was Percy Melgar. Percy earned two points for the Lady Red Devils with a fifth-place finish in the two-mile run and then came back to earn a crucial point in the 1,000 dash with a sixth-place effort

Angeline Nguyen likewise came through with a key sixth-place performance in the 600 dash.

"What was most impressive was that we only had eight girls, fielding the second smallest team at the meet," said CHS head coach Cesar Hernandez. "It was a team effort as every girl competing scored points contributing to the final score. This included some key sixth-place finishes from Percy Melgar

and Angeline Nguyen. If either of them had fallen to seventh in those events, it would have resulted in a tie for us with Greater Lowell.

"Many girls knew they would have to do events outside of their comfort zone because of the small team and it's because of that willingness that we achieved the success we did this season," Hernandez added.


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MVES RAISES MORE THAN \$44K

Bruins to honor '70 Cup team

Following last night's (Wednesday) game with the Chicago Blackhawks, as the second half of a backto-back, the Bruins will return to TD Garden ice on Saturday to host the Arizona Coyotes with a 3:00pm puck drop, the beginning of yet another back-to-back game affair, this time with the Detroit Red Wings hosting the Bruins on Sunday in the back end, in a rare 12:30 start. Division rival Montreal Canadiens will visit the Garden on Wednesday at 7:30pm.

CHARA HEADS 13TH ANNUAL PJ DRIVE

Boston Bruins captain Zdeno Chara will head the drive for the fifth time, the 13th Annual "PJ Drive" which benefits Massachusetts' youth in need, and will run until March 15. The "PJ Drive" provides new, unused pajamas to babies, children, and teens in communities across Massachusetts. The Bruins will be hosting an in-game PJ collection on Saturday, February 15 at the Bruins vs. Detroit Red Wings game at 1:00 p.m. at TD Garden. Fans who donate PJs or \$10 at this game will be entered in a raffle to win Bruins autographed prizes.

BRUINS TO HON-OR 1970 STANLEY CUP **TEAM**

The Boston Bruins have announced that the 1970 Boston Bruins Stanley Cup team will be honored during a pregame ceremony prior to the Bruins-Red Wings game on Tuesday, March 24. The 1969-70 Boston Bruins finished the season with a 40-17-19 record, leading the league with 277 goals scored. The team advanced to the Stanley Cup Final for the first time since 1958 and won its first championship in 29 years, bringing the Stanley Cup to Boston for the fourth time in franchise history.

Boston set a club record

with 10 consecutive wins, spanning from the final two games of the Quarterfinal series with the New York Rangers to sweeps of the Chicago Blackhawks in the Semifinals and St. Louis Blues in the Stanley Cup Final. The 1969-70 season also featured several individual player milestones and highlights. Bobby Orr became the first defenseman to win the Art Ross Trophy with 120 points and set a league record for a defenseman in the playoffs with nine goals and 11 assists, earning him the Conn Smythe Trophy, Hart Trophy and Norris Trophy as well. Phil Esposito finished second behind Orr in the Art Ross scoring race and was named to the First-Star Team after setting a league record in postseason scoring with 13 goals and 27 points. Goaltender Gerry Cheevers won 24 games, including a team-record 10 straight.

Coach Harry Sinden guided the team to an impressive 40-17-19 record, good for 99 points and second place in the NHL East Division. During the Quarterfinals the Bruins fought a tough battle with the New York Ranges, emerging with a victory in four of the six games. The Semifinals saw Boston rolling over the Chicago Blackhawks, taking four straight, and a spot

in the Stanley Cup Finals versus the expansion (1967) St. Louis Blues. It was on Mother's Day (May 10th) that Bobby Orr put the icing on the Cup-cake with his Cup-winning goal that produced a photo that has endured a half-century as 'legendary.' After 29 years of Cup-drought, the Bruins finally brought it back home when Orr took a pass from Derek Sanderson, behind the net - in overtime. and despite being tripped by Blues defenseman Noel Picard, Orr put the puck behind Blues goaltender Glen

Hall and the rest is history. Memory refresher of the Bruins 1970 Stanley Cup Champions roster listed: centers Phil Esposito, Fred Stanfield, Jim Lorentz, Derek Sanderson and Ivan Boldirev who was listed as a 'spare,' and did not play in the Finals. Wingers had: Ken Hodge, Sr., Johnny Bucyk, Wayne Carleton, Wayne Cashman, Garnet "Ace" Bailey (victim of 911), Ed Westfall, Johnny McKenzie, Don Marcotte, Dan Shock, Bill Lesuk and Ron Murphy. On the blueline: Bobby Orr, Rick Smith, Dallas Smith, Bill Speer, Gary Doak, Don Awrey and Ted Green who was injured and did not play. In net for Boston, Gerry Cheevers, Eddie Johnston and John Adams, listed as a

In the Stanley Cup Finals, goaltender Gerry Cheevers appeared in 13 games, losing only once to the New York Rangers, with Eddie Johnston absorbing the second loss, also versus the New York Rangers in the quarterfinals.



Barbara Zullo-Libby, 82, passed away unexpectedly in her Chelsea home on Saturday, Jan. 25.






